

GENERAL ORDER.

Horse-Guards, October 6, 1826.

The Commander-in-Chief is pleased to approve of General Officers Commanding Districts in Great Britain granting Leave of Absence to Officers, and Furloughs to Non-commissioned Officers and Soldiers, under the following Limitations and Restrictions, viz.

1. The Leave of Absence, granted under this Order to Officers, may commence as soon as the half-yearly Promotions shall have been made; the Furloughs granted to Non-commissioned Officers and Soldiers may commence from the 25th of the present month.

2. These Indulgences are to terminate on the 10th March next, when, in conformity to his Majesty's Regulations, all Officers and Men are to be present with their respective Regiments.

3. One Field Officer, One Half of the Captains, and One Half of the Subaltern Officers, are always to be present with their Regiments.

4. No Officer (except in the performance of Duty, or for the purpose of joining his Regiment) is to quit the United Kingdom without having first received his Majesty's special permission.

5. The Officers employed on the Recruiting Service, or upon the Staff of the Army, are not to be included in the Number hereby fixed for the constant Duty of the Regiment or Battalion.

6. The Applications for Leave for Regimental Paymasters, and Medical Officers, are to continue to be made in the mode prescribed in page 72 and 73, of the General Regulations of the Army.

7. In cases of short Leaves of Absence being requested by Adjutants, Riding-Masters, Quarter-Masters, or Veterinary-Surgeons of Regiments, it will be necessary that a special Report should be made as to the mode in which their Duties are to be performed during their Absence.

8. The proportion of Non-commissioned Officers, Trumpeters, Drummers and Private Men, to whom Furloughs may be granted, is not to exceed Ten per Troop or Company.

When Regiments or Battalions, are not stationed in Garrisons or in Military Districts, the Officers Commanding are at liberty to use their discretion in granting the Indulgence of Leave of Absence, under the foregoing Restrictions, to the Officers and Men under their command.

This Order does not apply to the Officers and Men doing duty with the Depot Companies of Regiments on Foreign Duty.

It is currently reported, in the high military circles, that an arrangement is about to take place, very acceptable to the Army, shewing the Commander-in-Chief's gracious disposition to its interests, whilst he recommends a reward for past services to the needy but meritorious Officers who cannot get on by purchase. The outlines of the plan appear to be, that, in time of peace, for the sake of regimental duty, the Brevet is not to go any further down than the Lieutenant-Colonels; but that in the other ranks there is to be a promotion (as recently) on the half-pay, viz., Subalterns having served fifteen years or upwards (and nine as Lieutenants) to be Captains—Captains twenty-one years and upwards (and seven as Captains) to be Majors—and Majors serving twenty-five years and upwards (five as Majors) to be Lieutenant-Colonels on the half-pay, from which they are to be replaced in the service by those young and active Officers lately promoted; amongst whom the Field Officers are generally those who have been Captains or Subalterns in the late war. Those old Officers rusting in the service, will be promoted on the half-pay, from which the army will receive the young but experienced Field Officers now lounging about the streets and taverns.

The Courier states that the above regulation is unfounded.

The entire of the 37th Regiment are now stationed in Cork.

Major Pattison, of the 97th Regiment, was entertained at Clonmel, on Monday, by the Officers of that Regiment, on his departure from them.

On Wednesday, the Parmelia transport sailed from Cork, for Barbadoes, with part of the 19th Regiment.

The 53d Regiment is daily expected at Templemore Barracks, which are at present occupied by a Subaltern's party of the 15th, who, with the detachment under Captain Doyle, at Nenagh, will proceed to Galway, when replaced by the 53d.

Accounts received from Barbadoes state the death of Captain Thomas Swyny and Lieutenant Henry Keane, of the 25th Regiment, and also some of the privates, who fell victims to the disease of the Island. Captain Swyny was son of the late Major Swyny, of Ennis, and Lieutenant Keane was lately stationed at Scariff, in this district. Their deaths are much regretted.

The 13th, 41st, 44th, and 89th Regiments, stationed in India, having completed their Establishment, recruiting for those Corps has ceased.

The military survey of Ireland is making great progress. The greater part of the counties of Derry and Antrim are finished, and will shortly be published in parish maps of six inches to a mile. As it is the intention of Government that the military survey should be combined with the naval one of the coast, which is to commence next summer, the whole strength of the military corps employed will next commence at Donegal. Thus in two years the three counties will be complete, and a correct delineation given of the sea coast extending from Sligo Bay to Belfast Lough; one on which there are more lives and property lost, is not to be found in equal extent along the coast of the British Isles.

Yesterday, the Mayor held an inquest on the body of John Connors, who, it appeared, died from the effect of a kick he got at the Races. A verdict of wilful murder was returned against the perpetrator.

A man named Edy Lacy, was killed by a blow from a pitch-fork, at Kileradon, County Clare, on Tuesday. The perpetrators are known.
