

On Thursday, in consequence of private information, a man was apprehended in the neighbourhood of Athlone, County Westmeath, charged with the murder of Mr. John Burne. Having a ball lodged in his leg, the effect of one of those shots which Mr. Burne fired in defending himself, will go far in convicting him.

Mr. Wynne has commenced operations under very encouraging auspices.

A very serious complaint is made by the Irish distillers, that the Scotch distillers are allowed a draw-back of 1s. a gallon on spirits, in return of a malt duty that never has been paid.

Attorney, of Richmond-street, who died in possession of a personal and landed property, in Waterford, Kildare, and Kilkenny, has given notice to the executors that he means to assert his right to such property.

DEATH OF JACOB MARK, Esq. Cork.—With very sincere regret and extreme concern, we perform the painful duty of announcing the demise of this valuable and much esteemed Gentleman. Mr. Mark had returned on Friday from the County of Kerry, and appeared in excellent health. On Saturday morning, proceeding upstairs, after breakfast, he was seized with a sudden and alarming illness; medical aid was instantly called, and every means tried to afford him relief, which skill an experience could suggest, but in vain, he expired about 4 o'clock in the evening. It is indeed almost superfluous to say, that amongst mercantile men, Mr. Mark was held in the highest estimation. In the discharge of the duties attached to the honourable situation of Consul to the United States of America, filled by Mr. M. for several years, he was indefatigable, zealous and attentive; the loss of his services will be regretted not only by the Government of that Country, but by every American seaman who had visited this port and district, and now appreciates the benefit derived from his judicious arrangements. In the circle of private life, Mr. Mark was distinguished for attachment to his family—they have, indeed sustained a loss which cannot be repaired.—Cork Paper.
