So furious has been the opposition to the Tolls and Customs in Galway, and so determined the spirit of the Collector and his assistants, that the entire town on Thursday was a scene of the most violent outrage and confusion. It was not until nearly the entire of the garrison were drawn out under arms, and the most vigorous measures taken that order was in any degree restored. The inertness of Public Justice in Galway is apparent enough, when a Sessions of the peace cannot be held there for want of justices to preside, and upwards of 100 prosecutions, some of a serious nature, have consequently become abortive.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 8.
The Commander-in-Chief, Lieut.-General Sir George Murray, G. C. H., and his Aid-de-Camp, Captain Lord Edward Hay, of the 72d Regiment, arrived in this City, on Sunday evening, on a tour of inspection in the Southern district. The gallant General was also accompanied by his lady and daughter, and put up at Swinburne's, where he was waited on by Major-General Sir Charles Doyle, the Officers of his Staff, and the Commanding Officers of the Corps in Garrison. Early on Monday, the General proceeded to the New Barracks to hold the inspection, and in the square the following Regiments were drawn up:—Brigade of Artillery, under Colonel Worsley; 2d Dragoons, (Scots' Greys,) Major Wemyss; 10th Foot, Major Grieve, and 24th, Lieut.-Colonel Fleming. The several corps went through the evolutions of the new system of tactics, with a degree of steadiness, ease and regularity, amply gratifying to the spectators, and the other manoeuvres consequent on such an occasion, were performed in the most correct military style.

When the inspection had terminated, Sir G. Murray addressed Sir Charles Doyle in complimentary terms expressing the satisfaction he felt on the excellent appearance of the troops, and the superior manner in which the various manoeuvres were executed. He also communicated to the Commanding Officers, respectively, his approbation of the correct and military department of the men. In the course of the day, the General minutely inspected the Barracks, Castle Barracks, and Artillery Barracks, entered the mess and bed-rooms, and was extremely pleased with the interior economy observed through this partment of the service.

Yesterday morning, Sir George Murray, and Sir Charles Doyle, set off for Clare Castle, to inspect the Depot of the 2d Rifle Brigade, under Lieut.-Colonel Mitchell; and this day Sir George left town for Cork in continuation of his tour.

The Depot of the 2d Rifles is expected in this garrison in Clare Castle, to be replaced by the Depot of the 17th Regiment.

On Tuesday last, the 17th Regiment, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel M'Lean, was inspected in Barrack-square of Mullingar, by Lieutenant-General George Murray, Commander of the Forces. Sir George expressed himself pleased with the correct and regular appearance of the Regiment, although so very lately arrived from England, and after a fatiguing march on Thursday by the Commander of the Forces. Lieutenant-General Thornton completed his half-yearly inspection of the Depot of the 50th Regiment at Balfast, on the 10th October, and was pleased to issue the following order:—

"The half-yearly inspection of the Depot Companies of the 50th Regiment, has fully satisfied Major-General Thornton that every possible attention has been paid to the economy by Major Anderson, the Commanding Officer, and other Officers, doing duty with them; and that every improved appearance of those companies, and every considerable progress they have made in the arms and field movements, since the Major-General last saw them, has more than answered his expectations."

Following Officers are present with the Depot of the 50th Regiment:—Captains Turner, Powell, Montagu, Bentley, Tudor, Edwards, Rose, and Enright; Lieutenants Hatson, Wainwright; and Mr. Kirwan's company of the 66th has arrived at Balfast, and Captain Duncan's company at Mullingar.

On Tuesday last, two parties who were disposed to riot in the town of Askeaton, were prevented by the interference of the Police, from proceeding to acts of violence and bloodshed. The contending factions were confined until a late hour in the bridewell and then discharged, as it was supposed their anger had ceased; but in the course of the night, one party attacked the dwelling house of Maurice Fitzgerald, of Ballinort, and beat his son in such a dreadful manner as to fracture his skull—the old man narrowly escaped, having received a blow of a stone which cut him severely; the other still lives, and we understand some hopes are entertained of his recovery.—Surgeon Franklin, of this City, and Doctor O'Hanlon, of Rathkeale, are in attendance. Some of the parties concerned in this outrage, are in custody and are identified.

On Sunday last, Bennett, of the County Police, arrested in Charleville, under a warrant from George Massy, Esq. Maurice Collins, charged with violently assaulting Maurice Hartnett, at Abbeyfeale, by which his skull was fractured.

John Lyons, of Sanderspark, Esq. and three of the County Police, succeeded in apprehending a desperate character named William Leonard, or Linchan, near Charleville, on Thursday, after a violent resistance. The Magistrates and Police have been long looking after the fellow, and several informations are sworn against him for various offences.

On Sunday morning, the house of Mr. J. Purcell, opposite the new Jail was broken into by a fellow named Dennis Madigan, who collected all the wearing apparel he could get, in order to carry it off, and was in the act of forcing a panel from the shutter of the shop window, when he was surprised from the rear and secured. Fortunately the moment two policemen were passing, to whom the villain was given in charge. He has been fully committed for trial at the next Assizes.

An inquest was held on Monday last by the Right Worshipful Nicholas Mahon, Esq. Mayor, on Pat. Lee, a young man, apprentice to a weaver, who was found dead on the morning of that day at his own door in Garryowen. No mark of violence was apparent, and a verdict, "Died by the visitation of God," was returned.

Yesterday, the Mayor held an inquest on the body of Joseph Smyth, a slater by trade, who died at his house in Cornwallis-street. This lamentable case was one of a novel and extraordinary nature, which has naturally attracted public attention in an unusual degree. The only witness examined was John Smyth, a brother of the deceased, who very reluctantly gave his testimony. He deposed, that he entered the house of his brother on the morning of the 31st October last, and there saw Joseph Smyth and Rose Smyth, the husband and wife, scolding each other; he endeavoured to persuade his brother to accompany him to his work, and he pacified; the wife returned by striking her a blow with his fist; the witness got the husband in his arms, and attempted to pull him away; at this moment, his brother received a blow of a working tool, called a sexe, on the back of his head; did not see who gave the blow; observed the sexe in a female hand and arm, but could not swear it was the wife, Rose Smyth, who struck the blow; there was no other woman in the house at the time; the woman instantly expressed her sorrow for the act. This evidence was very unwillingly given to the Jury, who then examined Surgeon Franklin, jun. who attended the deceased, and he deposed that the skull was fractured, and that it was the cause of his death. In default of further information, a verdict to the following effect was returned:—"That Joseph Smyth his wife, Rose Smyth," The unfortunate woman has absconded.

On Monday morning a deliberate and atrocious murder was committed on Richard Power, an industrious tenant of Lord Clancarty, in the neighbourhood of Loughrea. This diabolical and bloody act was committed by three men, who tied a rope round his neck in the first instance; when the unfortunate man declared his knowledge of the parties and they returned and finished the horrid deed. There is no possible cause assignable for this savage murder, excepting that Power suffered his children to attend the School established in the neighbourhood.

An important Inquest was held in Cork, on Monday, to enquire into the death of James Coghlan, on Monday, a party of rioters who, on Saturday night, attacked the City Sheriffs and Peace Officers with stones, in Barrack-street. The deceased appeared to have been struggling with Sheriff Wallace, unwilling to surrender, when a loaded pistol which that Gentleman held, went off, and the charge lodged in the head of the rioter, having fractured the skull and protruded part of the brain. He died in a few hours. The Jury after consulting for about twenty minutes, returned the following verdict—"We find and present that the deceased James Coghlan, came by his death in consequence of a shot from a pistol in the hands of John Wallace, Esq. one of the High Sheriffs of the City of Cork, which accidentally went off whilst in the act of making a blow at said Coghlan, when the said Sheriff was in the execution of his duty; but we cannot separate without expressing our opinion, that striking the blow when a loaded pistol was in his hands, was indiscreet and imprudent."

On Wednesday evening, the house of Mr. Clibborn, at Anner mills, Clonmel, was attacked by a party of fellows who knocked down the watchman and beat him severely. The barking of the dogs roused the family, and the villains, after firing at one, fled before assistance came up.

A serious riot took place on Sunday, at Hilltown, near Newry, when two lives were lost.
