A requisition has been presented to the Clerk of the Peace of this County, Richard Smyth, Esq. to convene a meeting of the Magistrates to consider the expediency of presenting a Memorial to the Lord Lieutenant and Council on the recent order to the High Sheriff for withdrawing the military from our Gaols after the 5th of January next. The meeting is convened accordingly for Monday next, the 4th December.—*See Advt.*

On Saturday night last, several armed men attacked the house of John Ryan, on the lands of Cameen, in the West Liberties of this City, and fired several shots through the windows. Finding their attempt at entrance ineffectual, (Ryan being armed with a pitchfork,) they demolished two houses contiguous, belonging to a farm which he had a few days before taken; the Police were instantly on the alert, but, mistaking the direction of the shots, the fellows escaped.

Monday night, a stack of oats, the property of Morgan Mulvihill, near the Commons of Rathkeale, was maliciously burned.

This day, the Magistrates of the District will investigate the late burning of Shannit's house at Shanagolden.

Michael Fitz-Gerald, jun. of Ballynort, near Askeator, died on Monday, of wounds received a short time ago from a party of men. An inquest was held on the body yesterday, and a man of the name of Somers is in custody on the charge.

On Sunday last, an Inquisition was held on the body of Michael Kean, at Six-miles-bridge, before Captain D'Alton and Henry Butler, Esq. Magistrates for the County of Clare, (Coroner not attending) when a verdict of Wilful Murder was returned against Connor Cleary of Cratloe, and several others—having given a dreadful blow of a stone to Keane, which caused his death. Cleary and six of the party are lodged in Ennis Jail.

The six Service Companies of the 84th Regiment, under the command of Colonel Neynoe, marched from Buttevant to Cork yesterday, preparatory to their embarkation for Jamaica.

A Circular has been issued from the Horse Guards to the Staff of districts and parties of other Corps, to cease enlisting for the 6th, 33rd, 45th, 47th, 54th, and 87th Regiments, stationed in India, whose Recruiting is to be confined exclusively to their own parties, until further orders.

Orders have been received by the Commanding Officers of the Depots of the 2d (or Queen's) 6th, 20th, 41st, 47th and 89th Regiments, stationed in Canterbury, to furnish for embarkation, to join their respective regiments in India, two Field Officers, four Captains, twenty-three Subalterns, and nine hundred and ninety rank and file. They will march from Canterbury early in January next.

The depot of the Staff of the Tipperary Militia is to be removed immediately from Clonmel to Caher, in consequence of Lord Glengall becoming their Commanding Officer.

The awful death of two brothers, named Ryan, mentioned in our last, was occasioned by placing in their bed-room a few coals of fire, in a stove, to heat the apartment. There was no chimney in the room, they closed their door, and unfortunately retired to rest without observing the precaution of extinguishing the fire—the result was fatal, and they were found suffocated in the morning, the smoke which accumulated having no vent whereby to escape.
