The new Steam boat for navigating the Canal hence to Dublin, and drawing boats of burden has arrived at her destination, and is now moored at the first lock of our canal.

On Monday last, a man named William Carthy, was found dead in the neighbourhood of Newbridge. An inquest was held by the Magistrates on the body, which was lying there for three days, and a verdict "died by the visitation of God," was returned.

On Wednesday, an inquest was held on the body of Michael Fitz-gerald, of Ballynort, Askeaton, mentioned in our last, when, after a protracted enquiry, the following verdict was returned:—"We find that the deceased came to his death from inflammation of the lungs, induced by a severe beating from Michael Somers, alias Fitz-Gibbon."

A few days ago, a man named Folgy, a resident of Castleisland, fell down the stairs of a public house in that town and was killed on the spot.

On Friday se'night, a large out-house, belonging to a dairy-man of Mr. C. Curtin's, of Killikilun, accidentally took fire and was burned to the ground.

On Thursday evening last, as some constables were on their way from Tipperary to their station at Cullin, they were waylaid by four ruffians who attacked one of them, of the name of Gray, who was at some distance behind his comrades, and after knocking him down, carried off his gun. In their escape they passed through the lawn of Grenane while Mr. Mansergh was speaking to some of his tenantry; on coming near Mr. Mansergh one of the fellows presented the gun at him, on which Mr. Mansergh called on the tenants that were present to assist him in apprehending the fellow, but they refused. Shortly after Richard Roach servant to the Hon.
