The fair of Six-mile-bridge, on yesterday, was well attended, although the weather proved very unfavorable. There was no advance in prices. Yet, numerous sales were effected—Bullocks were much in demand, and Store bullocks averaged 7l. to 9l. 10s. and fat cows from 6l. 10s. to 10l., and one lot brought 10l. 15s. for the Cork Market. Many lots of cows remained unsold, the holders being unwilling to part for the prices offered.

There was a large exhibition of horses at the fair of Clonroad, on Monday, but of such inferior quality that very few were disposed of, although many buyers attended. The show of horned cattle was not great, having been reserved for the fair of Six-Mile-bridge.

The Members of the Limerick Hunt dined together on Saturday, for the first time this season. At seven o'clock upwards of forty of the most respectable resident Gentlemen in the County, sat down to dinner, Edward Croker, Esq. in the Chair. The convivial disposition of the party, aided by the goodness of the wines, prolonged their sitting to a late hour. Before dinner a ballot took place, when several Gentlemen were admitted; and we are happy to find, that this long wished for establishment is likely to rival any of the kind in the Kingdom.

STEAM NAVIGATION.

We learn, from a Gentleman who came passenger in the Nora Creina Steam Vessel, from Liverpool to Waterford, that, in spite of a heavy gale of wind in their teeth, and strong tide against them, the Nora Creina made the port of Waterford early on Saturday last.

Such was the violence of the wind, that the Captain of the Nora Creina states it was impossible to stand on deck without holding on. If it be true, that this description of vessel may be propelled against a heavy sea and strong adverse winds and tide, (and we have no reason to doubt it,) why do not the Citizens of this place establish such a mode of commercial intercourse? The comparatively small City of Waterford has now two Steam Vessels, the St. Patrick, of 300 tons, plying between Liverpool and Waterford, and the Nora Creina, of 330 tons, intended as a regular Packet to Bristol, and owned in Waterford—while the famous treaty-making City of Limerick has not yet contracted for one Vessel of this kind, calculated for intercourse, by sea, with the Commercial Towns, with which we are most intimately connected. We have no doubt that a single vessel, like the Nora Creina, could maintain a regular weekly communication between this Port and Liverpool; that is, if the Custom-house entries, and discharging and loading, could be dispatched here as in Liverpool, one and the same Steam-Vessel might leave this every Saturday, and Liverpool every Wednesday, of every week in the year.

We understand that the Nora Creina was built by W. Seddon, and Co., who are extensively engaged in this branch of ship-building. Mr. Seddon planned the model and superintended the building of the Commerce, one of the City of Dublin Company's Steam-Vessels, an excellent sea-boat, and carrying a large cargo. He is now engaged in building two other Steam-Vessels for the same Company.

We fervently wish that the stigma of being so far behind our sister Sea-Ports in Ireland, (some of them so much inferior in population,) in this modern improvement in facility of commercial intercourse, will shortly be removed. What are our Chamber of Commerce doing? Will they suffer some foreign Company to forestall us in the establishment of Steam-Packets for our own Port?
