On Tuesday last, a riotous party of men assembled on the lands of Ballinvober, near Pallis-Keary, in this Co., and demolished the doors and windows of the house of a farmer, named Ranahan—broke his furniture in pieces—and then beat the family in a most cruel manner. Still unsatisfied they set on Michael Ranahan, a son of the proprietor, and with sticks and stones inflicted wounds of so severe a nature that he died next morning. It is revolting to human nature to learn, that one of the most active in this horrid tragedy was a brother of the deceased, who had married into a family which was displeasing to his father, and hence arose the unchristian warfare between relatives and friends, the old man having refused him part of his farm on the occasion of his marriage. An inquest has been held on the body by Mr. Cox, the Coroner, assisted by John Waller, Esq. of Goolstown, and a verdict of Wilful Murder returned against the entire party, three as principals, and eleven as abettors. Four men are already in custody for the crime, and warrants are out against the others, who have absconded.

Thursday night, an out-house belonging to a poor woman, named Tierney, residing at the Black-boy Turn-pike, was broken into by some persons, who took away a large quantity of potatoes. This is the second attack that has been made upon this poor woman's means; the first time, the villains having beaten every person in the house, carried off several articles of furniture, wearing apparel, &c. The only cause assigned for this cruel treatment, is her having taken the house she now lives in, after a tenant who had been ejected nearly six months previous for non-payment of rent.

We regret to learn the death of George H. Hastings, Esq. of Killaloe, on his return from the fair of O'Brien's Bridge yesterday evening by falling into the river.— Mr. Hastings was a gentleman of the most amiable and honorable feelings, and his premature death is much lamented by the inhabitants of Killaloe, to whom he acted on all occasions the part of a friend and patron.

Yesterday, the Mayor held an inquest in the County Infirmary on the body of Ellen Tobin, a female of much notoriety on the Town, and at one period possessed of considerable personal attractions. It appeared from evidence, that the unfortunate creature had some days previous fallen into the fire, by which she was terribly burnt; but, whether the mishap was occasioned by intoxication or any other cause could not be ascertained. A verdict of accidental death was returned. The fate of this depraved woman presents, at all events, a solemn warning to others who may pursue a similar life of infamy and wickedness, which invariably ends in the lowest stage of human misery.
