The Charitable Room-keepers Society of Dublin, relieved last year, 6,497 families, comprising 22,262 individuals .- The Rev. Charles Fraser, of Clongowes, is to preach a sermon in behalf of the Society on Sunday, in the Metropolitan chapel.

Two medical gentlemen of professional celebrity, met in Capel-street, on Thursday, when one of them grossly assaulted the other, giving him a violent blow on the face, followed by a severe kick. He then spit in his face and withdrew, saying to the spectators, " the rascal knows where to find me."

Information having been received yesterday, at the Head Police-office, that E. Jacob, Esq. of the County Wicklow, and Captain Goodwin, of Lower Fitzwilliamstreet, accompanied by their seconds, had proceeded to the Dargle, for the purpose of fighting a duel, Alderman Darley gave immediate orders to have Peace Constable Franklin, of the Horse Police, despatched in pursuit of them, with directions to inform a Magistrate of the circumstance, for the purpose of having them arrested .-Franklin's speed was of that extraordinary description, that although he had to make several inquiries on the way, he arrived at the spot where they left their carriages, a distance of eleven miles in less than an hour; his endeavours to ascertain from the coachmen where the parties had gone to being unsuccessful, he proceeded to the residence of Captain Sands, a Magistrate, which was a mile further, and having told the object of his visit, that gentleman accompanied him to the ground, a field at Old Court, but before their arrival the parties had fired two shots each, and were in act of loading a third time, when they were taken into custody and brought to the Magistrates office, where they were bound over to the peace after which one of them declared that it should not end there upon which Mr. Sands used every exertion to effect a reconciliation without effect. We have not heard of the cause of quarrel.

A public dinner is to be given at Hayes's Tavern, Dawson-street, on the 12th February, to Mr. Dawson, M. P. for Louth, to celebrate the triumph of purity of election in that County.

During the last week, a party of the Sligo Revenue Police engaged in duty near Ballymote, perceiving a light in a house and conceiving it to be a private distillery, repaired to it, and on entering found seven men with their faces blackened and the proprietor of the house bound hand and foot-It seems the light was occasioned by a large fire which the robbers had put down for the purpose of subjecting the unhappy individual to the flery ordeal, in order to extort from him a confession relating to his property. The police immediately secured the party and released the captive. The police the morning after marched this formidable party to the Sligo Jail, to abide their trial at the ensuing Assizes.

Lord Enniskillen and a number of Magistrates met in the Grand Jury room of Belfast on Monday last, in consequence of a complaint preferred by Captain Galbraith against Colquhoun Colclough, Esq. of the constabulary stationed in that town. The parties, on the advice and suggestion of Lord Enniskillen, and the other Magistrates, had a mutual reconciliation.

On Wednesday, a party of robbers, ten in number, and well armed, entered the house of Edmond Maley, at Croagh, compelled all the family to retire to an inner room, and placed two centinels on the door and two on the window, while the remaining six commenced their lawless plunder. They robbed the house of £20 in cash, together with a great quantity of wearing apparel and every portable article they found.

On Tuesday night last, a party of midnight insurgents attacked the house of a man named Mangner, near Kilcoleman, in this County, and not getting admittance, broke the windows, which were fortunately so small as not to permit an entrance, and the fellows retired.

Yesterday evening, a poor man fell, apparently through exhaustion, in Rutland street, and died in a few moments. His desperate situation was observed by some by-standers as he lay extended on the flags, but every effort for his recovery proved utterly hopeless, and his lifeless body was removed to the City Court-House for an inquest .-How revolting it must be to the feelings of a man and a Christian to suspect even that a fellow-creature was hurried off by the chill grasp of death from absolute want and starvation, as is believed to be the case in the present instance! The name of the unfortunate man is ascertained to have been James O'Hara, by trade a shoemaker, and originally from Kinsale. It appeared in evidence, that he sunk under the combined pressure of poverty and

The Lord Lieutenant has ordered the suspension of the Chief Constable, whose conduct towards a Magistrate of this County was the subject of investigation at Croom, some time since, as stated in the Chronicle; and this more lenient sentence is solely on account of the testimony borne by the prosecutor himself towards that Officer's previous public conduct.

In the Court of King's Bench, Dublin, on Wednesday, Mr. West applied to set aside an attachment procured by the Attorney, of Mr. Hoby, of London, the eminent boot-maker, against the late Sheriffs of the City of Limerick, Messrs. Westropp and Collis, on the ground that they omitted to make a return on an execution against a Gentleman of Limerick, who was then and is still in jail, on prior demands. The Court, after hearing Mr. West and Mr. O'Loghlen for the Sheriffs, and Mr. Bennett and Mr. Litton for the Attorney, discharged the attachment, as it appeared the non-return was caused through neglect, and not through collusion with the debtor-each party paying their own costs. The Parmelia transport, Johnson, arrived at Portsmouth, on Sunday, with the first division of the 21st Fusileers, from St. Vincents.

The entire of the transports with the 19th and 86th Regiments from Cork, have arrived all well in the West Indies. The 19th have proceeded to Demerara to relieve the 27th, the latter Regiment relieve the 21st Fusileers at St. Vincent and Grenada, and the 21st then return to Europe. The 86th Regiment relieved the 9th at Trinidad and Tobago. The 9th have since arrived in England, and the first division of the 21st.

Two companies of Artillery from England, have arrived at Barbadoes in the Southworth transport, which will return with invalids.

The Garrison of Barbadoes is at present composed of the 1st patralion 1st Royals, 25th King's Borderers, a company of Sappers and Miners, and a company of Artillery -all very healthy.

The 85th and 95th Regiments from Malta, are reported to succeed the 23d and 43d Light Infantry Regimente at Gibraltar.

It is reported that the depot of the 88th Regiment, new in Clonmel, are shortly to be removed to Cork, and that they are to be replaced there by the 73d, at present stationed in Waterford.

The first division of Sir Edward Blakeney's brigade, consisting of the 4th, 10th, and 60th Regiments, is ordered from Lisbon to Villa France, a place about 20 miles distant, and thence it is expected to Coimbra. Colonel Marie, the Deputy Judge Advocate, has gone forward to that station to make arrangements.

The Hon. John Chetwynd Talbot is appointed Captain in the Staffordshire Militia, vice Neale, resigned.
