

Leahy v. Ambrose.
 an action of Assumpsit to recover £59, half year's rent, March 1822, due for occupation of 32 acres of the lands of Ballywid Leahy, Assignee of Daniel Leahy, was and Margaret Ambrose, widow and administratrix of Robert Ambrose, Defendant. There was a Plaintiff £50 damages and 6d costs. It was a feature in the transaction, that, in March, various parts of the County Limerick were roused in Insurrection and disturbance, the Ambrose, then a comfortable farmer, was found in his house, and his furniture and property ruined by a malicious fire.
 Plaintiff—Mr. O'Connell, and Mr. Cooper.

On the 10th of this Record, Judge Lefroy entered in Court, when Michael O'Donnell, indicted for abetting in the wilful murder of Denis Cappenahane, and also for stealing in the case of the said Morrissy, was acquitted of the offence found guilty of the latter offence.
 Leahy, who was indicted for burglariously dwelling of T. M'Carthy, and having stolen some whiskey and other articles, was acquitted of the charge, but found guilty of the stealing and of being under the Whiteboy Act.

Danaher and Mary Heffernan, for stealing Mary Buckley, stealing wearing apparel, not sentenced; John Hegarty, larceny, three months' imprisonment; James Ryan, stealing wearing apparel, seven months' transportation; John Murphy, stealing spoons and articles, Mary Mulahy, stealing a prayer book, John Sullivan, stealing a cloak, not sentenced; Mary, stealing wearing apparel, three months' imprisonment; Michael Hogan and Margaret Hogan, for their transportation; William Hewett, stealing 3 months' imprisonment; Mary Slattery, stealing wearing apparel, 7 years' transportation; Margaret, stealing a £5 Bank Post Bill, not sentenced; Mary, stealing ribbons, 3 months' imprisonment; Mary, stealing a cloak, 7 years' transportation; Delahan, pig stealing, 3 months' imprisonment; Murray, robbery at Loughcooter Castle also not sentenced; Patrick Gillespie, William Patrick Noonan and Thomas Walsh, stealing £5 in notes, Gillespie to be transported 7 years, the other three not sentenced; Margaret Halpin, not sentenced; Rose Smyth, for the death of her husband in Cornwallis-street, guilty of murder, sentenced to pay six pence; J. Halpin, J. and Thomas Cagney, for breaking into the house of Keane, of Raheen, sentence of Death recorded; John, highway robbery of a bayonet from a soldier, 24th, sentence of death recorded; Thomas and John Leonard, having forged bank notes in a large quantity, not sentenced; John Flanagan for ditto, not sentenced; Thomas M'Inerny, ditto, fourteen years' imprisonment.

Of the City Records have yet been tried. Sentences, claiming nearly £450 for damages have been committed on premises in the Liberties and otherwise, have been nilled by the Jury.

Following are the convictions which took place at the Assizes.—Michael Carroll, for assaulting the person of Edward Synge, Esq. to be hanged at Ennis, on the 12th of May; Timothy Sheedy, for rape, sentence of death recorded, Michael Fogarty, coining, sentence of death recorded, John German, for manslaughter, to be transported for seven years; J. Dowdes, John Downes, and James Mungovan, for manslaughter, sentence of death recorded; Cornelius Cleary and Patrick Naughten, for manslaughter, to be imprisoned 12 months; Michael Thomas Smith, and Patrick Hayes, for manslaughter, to be transported for seven years.
