Thomas O'Brien and Thomas Carroll, for assaulting, injuring, breaking into, and maliciously setting fire to the habitations of John Madigan, John Leahy, and Patrick Madigan, at Faha, in this County, on the night of the 16th April, 1823—Death, on Saturday the 14th of April next. The principal witness in this case was an approver. The Jury were a long time in deliberation. Both prisoners are very fine young men, and received good characters.

Patrick Harding, for assaulting the habitation of James Egan, at Fortwilliam, and causing the outer door to be opened—Death, on the 14th of April next.

Patrick Leary, for burglary in the house of Thomas M'Carthy, at Garrinderk, with intent to steal—Death.

William Roche, for burglary and abduction of Mary Woulfe, at Dromada—Death.

Patrick Browne, James Linehan, and Wm. Linehan, for assaulting and burglariously entering the habitation of William Donohue, at Croughteen—Death.

Thomas Hayes, for feloniously shooting at Patrick Hayes, at Kilnegariff, with intent to murder him—Death.

Several Presentments, with erasures and amendments, were remarked upon by his Lordship, who said (the least of it,) a slovenly way to have a road, and that in such cases they ought to be referred to the Sessions by the Magistrates. The observation which he had to make while on circuit was, that he found that there was not a due attention paid at the Road Sessions—that the business was generally left to two or three, and they should have a number where such large sums of money were to be levied, there ought to be a sufficient number, and the money should be in the disposal of a few. In one case, at the Sessions, he found no less a sum than £4,000 was levied by the Magistrates.
