On Wednesday, the dwelling house and offices of Mr.
 George Furlong-Low, situate near Buttevant, were
 maliciously consigned to the flames, and utterly de-
 stroyed, with a horse, farming utensils, and other
 articles of property.

A wretched man was robbed, a few days ago, near
 Killenaule, of £4, by two ruffians, who beat him so
 severely that death ensued. The murderers are com-
 mitted to Clonmel Gaol.

On Friday night last, a gang of ruffians attacked the
 house of a man of the name of Beere, near Garryroon,
 County Tipperary. Beere and his son, who are Protes-
 tants, bravely resisted the ruffians, and the latter succee-
 ded in shooting one of the villians, whose body, while
 exposed in the streets of Caher, on Saturday last, was
 owned by his wife; the fellow's name was Fitzgerald.

The Police of Ardfinan, under the direction of Mr.
 Chief Constable Singleton, apprehended a man of the
 name of Daniel, in whose house they found a blunder-
 buss, heavily loaded, a case of pistols loaded and all in
 good order; and an officer's sword—which has been
 identified by Mr. Croke, who was lately robbed of his
 arms.

On Thursday night, the house of Mr. Florence Carroll,
 near Killenaule, was entered about 11 o'clock, by a
 party of armed men, who broke in through the hall.
 Mr. C. got up and enquired who was there; the fellows
 demanded a delivery of his arms, and on his refusing
 they fired up at him Mr. Carroll returned the fire and
 the fellows fled, after taking with them decanters, silver
 spoons, and a silver tankard. They robbed several houses
 afterwards, but five of the party were arrested.

The Country is indebted to Francis Despard, of
 Killaghy Castle, Esq. for the apprehension of William
 Gorman, a principal in the horrid burning of the Shea
 family, in November, 1821. Two others of the name of
 Maher, have already forfeited their lives at the scaffold,
 for this atrocious outrage.

Yesterday, an inquest was held at Mount-Pellier, in
 this County, on the body of John Picket, of Woodford,
 Co. Galway, who, on Wednesday night last, having
 retired to bed in good health, was found dead the follow-
 ing morning. James Bennett, Esq., Coroner, with Mr.

 having died by the visitation of God.

On Saturday, an inquest was held at Fermoy, near
 Glanamera, on the body of a servant who was found dead
 on the road from this City, the previous evening. Verdict,

 found suspended by the neck in a stable at Smithstown,
