

alias Leamy, stealing wearing apparel—to be sentenced for seven years; Ellenor Connell, for stealing a towel, a bag, and some pieces of calico, the property of Mrs. Higgins, of Clonmel; Guilty, seven years. Ellen Shea was indicted for stealing, at Clon-Suir, 30*l.* the property of Michael Gallaher, and on being sentenced to transportation for seven years exclaimed, "thank you, Sir; I am much obliged to you;" Michael Guilfoyle, for burglariously breaking the dwelling-house of John Ryan, near Nenagh, and taking thereout a gun, the property of Mr. Hill—of death recorded; Johanna Dwyer, for stealing 10*l.* Guilty; Mary Burn was indicted for stealing, at Clonmel, a 20*l.* note, the property of James O'Connor—Timothy Guilfoyle, stealing a sheep, the property of Mr. Kennedy—Guilty; Thomas Ryan, stealing a sheep, the property of Thomas Hayes, and four other lambs, the property of James Magher—Honora Magrath, stealing eight yards of lace, the property of Miss A. Russell, of Carrick-on-Suir—to be transported for seven years.

The Record Court the following cases were discussed:—
O'Mara v. Heney was left to the arbitration of the arbitrators.

John Mannin v. John Shaw Mandeville.
This was an action for trespass vi et armis—damages 100*l.* At a former Assizes the Plaintiff in the action obtained a verdict for 50*l.* against Mr. Mannin for seizing a horse for rent alleged to be due; and of the present action was for executing a writ on the person of the Plaintiff about twelve o'clock on the night of the 31st of last August, and imprisoning the Plaintiff on the authority of that decree in the Gaol of Clonmel. The Jury, after consulting for about half an hour, returned a verdict for the Plaintiff—50*l.* damages and costs.

Horan v. Hodgins.

This was an action for the recovery of the lands of Seanoddy, of which Plaintiff and others were dispossessed by Defendant. The value of moveable property and of the growing crops were sworn to. The Jury found the value of the moveable property (furniture &c. &c.) to be 559*l.* 9*s.* and of the growing crops (wheat and potatoes) to be 578*l.* 10*s.* and that these were sufficient to countervail the rent—720*l.*—due on the 6th of last April 1824.

After an investigation which occupied nine hours, on Monday, William Gorman was convicted at the Clonmel Assizes, on the clearest evidence, as a principal in the murder and burning of the Sheas.

At the Assizes of Kilkenny, last week, John Maher was found guilty, and ordered to be executed, for stabbing John Whelan, with intent to murder him.

There are seven records for trial at Galway, and four at Clonmel. In the latter County the Crown business is suspended and but 69 for trial.

Thomas Cosby Esq. is Foreman of the Queen's County Grand Jury, and John C. Moutray Esq. foreman of the Tipperary Grand Jury. The County representatives are to be chosen from the panel of either.

At the late County Waterford Assizes there were seven convictions among which, were one for high-robbery, one arson, one embezzling a letter, three for stealing, four felony, one having forged notes in his possession. Seven are to be hanged on the 9th April.

In the City Court sentence of execution has been pronounced on four men.

The Lord Lieutenant has fixed the 30th instant to be the Ballybrood tithe appeal case.
