The first dinner of the new Brunswick Club, in Cork, was attended on Tuesday by nearly ninety Gentlemen, electors of that City. Among whom were the Earl

Colonel Hodder, Major Beresford, M. P. Mr. Gerard Callaghan, Alderman Newsom, Captain Westropp, R. N. and Counsellors Jackson and Townshend.

There was a numerous meeting of the Roman Catholics in Cork, on Wednesday—Captain Galway, in the Chair. The speakers were Counsellor Coppinger, Rev. Thomas England, Mr. Maurice O'Connell, Mr. Ronayne, Counsellor O'Connell, and others. Mr. Ronayne advocated a repeal of the Union, Annual Parliaments, Universal Suffrage and Radical Reform, avowing his belief that all mankind were corrupt, if they had but power.—Mr. O'Connell is reported to have been unusually severe. He declared himself a convert to Universal Suffrage but not to Annual Parliaments. He contrasted Sir Thomas Moore, the Chancellor of former times, with Lord Eldon, whose only object seemed avarice, persecution and the tyranny of Ireland. Gerard Callaghan, the golden calf of the Orangemen might be yet in a mad-house. The Chief Secretary of Ireland was crooked eye Goulburn. Perry Dawson was a bit of a mongrel; and Peel and Eldon tolerant only if they could put their feet on the necks of Catholics—Lord Mountcashel was a chip in the mill, but thoroughly tinged with Orange. Mr. O'Connell related an anecdote of a Mr. Barnett, an agent of the Hibernian School Society, who in company with a Catholic Clergyman, in Ennis, said that religion was a good thing in enabling them to delude the people, and that he felt more inclined to agree with the Alcoran than the Bible. Mr. O'Connell added, that this Missionary had used blasphemous expressions regarding the Trinity, which he could not repeat, and denied the divinity of the redeemer. Mr. O'Connell's observations were heard amidst cheering and laughter; and after a variety of resolutions the meeting dissolved.

The Protestant Gentry of the County Galway have called a Meeting, for the purpose of petitioning Parliament in favour of the Catholic Claims. The requisition signed by eleven Grand Jurors out of fifteen Protestants; by seven Magistrates and fourteen Landed Proprietors. The Hon. W. Le Poer Trench, Garbally; Denis H. Kelly, Castlekelly; W. M. Burke, Ballyagan; John Henry Blakeney, Abbett, Esqrs. Grand Jurors, refused to sign the requisition.—*Connaught Journal.*

This day, Thomas O'Brien, Patrick Harding, and Patrick Leary, for whiteboyism, were executed, pursuant to their sentences, in front of the New County Jail.—The unfortunate culprits were turned off without expressing any declaration of their guilt or innocence, to the large crowd before them. Before the drop fell, Thomas O'Brien fainted from excessive weakness, and remained half suspended, when the platform gave way—his feet, at this moment, clung to the cross-beam, and, to relieve him from the agony of such a situation, a soldier extricated the feet, and he swung then with his fellows; but the sad accident evidently prolonged his mortal sufferings, and his body was painfully convulsed.

The convicts were attended to the scaffold by the Rev. Messrs. Tuohy, O'Grady and Malone, Roman Catholic Clergymen.

The 8th Hussars, commanded by Lord W. Russell, leave Brighton for Ireland, on Monday next. Part of the baggage, and the first division of the 7th Hussars, from Scotland, who were to succeed them, arrived at Brighton on Friday, and the second division on Saturday.

The Depot Companies of the 79th Highlanders, stationed at Cavan, have unanimously subscribed, the officers three, the non-commissioned officers, drummers, and privates, one day's pay, towards the erection of a monument in Edinburgh, to the memory of his late Royal Highness the Duke of York.

The 21st, 71st, 79th, and 93d Regiments have subscribed to the Duke of York's monument.

Captain Bourke, stationed at Croom, is appointed Chief Constable of Police, at Naas, Co. Kildare.

The Committee of the House of Commons on the Galway Election have decided, that Richard Martin, Esq. was not duly elected, and that Mr. Lambert ought to have been returned instead. The Chairman also added that he would make a Report to the House, recommending it to adopt some measures to secure the freedom of election in the County of Galway, for the future.

Both Houses of Parliament adjourned on Thursday, to the 30th instant.
