On Monday morning, at five o'clock, 96 male convicts from the County, and 13 from the City Gaol, were transmitted hence on cars to the Surprise hulk at Cove, escorted by a guard of the 24th Regiment and Scots' Greys. The friends and relatives of the unfortunate men uttered the most piercing cries on their departure, and the separation in some cases was most affecting.

The High Sheriff of the County Clare has received an order to transmit fourteen convicts to Cork, for transportation. The High Sheriff has also received a respite for Michael Carroll, capitally convicted of firing at Mr. Synge, and attacking his dwelling house.

The above convicts arrived here this day, in company with another party from Galway Gaol, the entire under an officer's guard of the 99th Regiment, and an escort of the County Clare Cavalry Police.

On Sunday night, an armed party attacked a poor man's house named Kearns, in the employment of George Wayland, Esq. within five miles of Cashel. The miscreants inquired for a man named Hickey, who unfortunately went out, on which one of them immediately knocked him down with the butt end of a gun; the ill-fated man was about to rise, when he was fired at by another of the gang, and instantly deprived of life!

A party of Hockites assembled on Monday night last, and attacked the Castle of Ballyquirk, the property of Thomas Monsell, Esq. which lies in Lower Ormond, County of Tipperary, and which has lately been ejected; they called out the keeper who was in care of the place, who when they found he was determined on making resistance, decamped, after smashing every window in the Castle.

On Wednesday night, four sheep, the property of the Earl of Donoughmore, were maliciously killed on the lands of Knocklofty.

Wednesday night, a barn belonging to Mr. Edmondson, on the lands of Drish, Co. Tipperary, was set on fire and burnt to the ground.

A few days ago, William Rae, a boatman of the Kerry Coast Guard, was attacked near Tralee, and deprived of his fire-arms.

Bolan and Brogan, for the attack on Mr. Reid, at Galway, have been respited.

A poor man named Thomas McEniry, having attended a funeral from Newcastle to Castlemahon, on his return home on Sunday night, fell into a ditch, and was found dead next morning.

On Sunday last, the Mayor held an inquest on the body of Jeremiah Morrissey, who was found drowned at the pool that morning by a Fisherman. The deceased was a young man and an agricultural labourer; from Aughnagare, in the County Tipperary, and had secured a birth in a vessel proceeding hence for America. On Good Friday night last, he fell between the vessel and the quay, in the act of stepping aboard, and was unfortunately drowned.

On Saturday last, four children, from the age of eleven to five years, belonging to a man named Draddy alias Aher, living at Knockadoun, in the parish of Kilcredon, and barony of Imokilly, County of Cork, were poisoned by eating a quantity of the wild parsnip root. They were dreadfully convulsed for some hours and died in the most excruciating agony.

Three Roman Catholics conformed to the Established Faith in the Church of Ballingarry, on Sunday last.

On Monday, Dr. Wilkinson presided at a meeting in the Commercial Buildings, to consider the depressed state of the funds of the Foundling Hospital, and the great increase of infants thrown on that Institution. A Committee was formed to collect subscriptions, and to devise a mode of relieving St. Michael's parish from the principal burden of supporting the charity.

Mr. Thomas Reed, a gentleman who evinced the highest abilities during his apprenticeship to Surgeon Colles, and eminently distinguished himself at his examination in the Dublin College of Surgeons, has been chosen to superintend the Newcastle Dispensary. The appointment of a person possessing such superior acquirements and experience in the various branches of Medical and Surgical science, reflects the greatest credit on the management of that Institution.

The aspect of the country is much improved by the late reasonable rain—the young plants look flourishing—and vegetation is in rapid progress. Should the weather continue mild for a short interval more, we may anticipate a plentiful and luxuriant crop.

A vessel with several tons of potatoes from the west of the County Clare, has been loaded for Dublin, and cargoes have also been conveyed from the same quarter to Cork and Waterford.

The fair of O'Brien's Bridge yesterday was rather dull, and indifferently supplied with stock. The demand was confined in a great measure to milch cows, prices of which are evidently on the look up. In other description of cattle sales by no means satisfactory.

Horned cattle were in high request at the Spring fair of Ballinasloe on Monday. The show of stock was not so large as on former occasions, but not a single beast remained unsold, and heifers carried in many instances £8 to £14 a head.

Waterford May Fair, on Saturday, was the largest ever seen of horned cattle. Forward strippers were from 5s. to 8s.; milch cows, 7s. 5s. to 10s.; store pigs rather improving.

Carlow Fair, on Friday, presented an unusually great show of horned cattle—principally, dry cows. Many lots went off pretty freely at an average per head of 7l. British Yearling calves, at 40s. to 50s. The supply of beef, which was scanty, brought about 2l. per cwt. Sheep, yearlings, for stock, sold at 20s. to 22s. and several purchases were made. Pork was looking up.
