CALAMITOUS EFFECTS OF THE STORM OF WEDNESDAY-LOSS OF THIRTEEN LIVES ON THE SHANNON.

Twenty-five persons embacked in a sail-boat, near Beagh-Castle, in this river, on Wednesday, to collect sex weed, in the neighbouring Islands, for the purpose of manure. When heavily laden, and about to put off. several of those on board took alarm at the angry aspect of the waves, which, ruffied by the tempest, lashed the surrounding shore with unsparing fury. An all-wise Providence prompted the idea of danger; they disembarked and left their ill-fated companions (eleven men and two women) with a determination to encounter the passage home. The frail vessel was so over-loaded, by the anxiety or avarice of the owner to seeire a large cargo, that she absolutely foundered in the coming tide, which, rushing like a torrent, overwhelpfed her in an instant, within a fow yards of land, Laving a wild blank, diversified only by the evanescent prospect of thirteen human beings struggling between this world and the next. The agonizing cries of the wretched sufferers were hurried on the blast towards shore, where their distracted friends, unable to afford assistance, gazed intently on the spectacle of life and death. But the almost intolerable suspense existed for a moment only-idle was the contest of wesk mortality, when an immense surge choaked the last effort of expiring nature. In the space of fifteen minutes. their bodies, borne on the bosom of the sullen waves, rolled slowly and heavily to the nearest shore, where the receding waters left them without a spark of life, to be vainly clasped in the fond embrace of despairing friends and kindred, whose bitter cries not even the howling blast could smother.

This deplorable record of calamity has plunged many families into the depth of sorrow and distress; in one instance, nine children have become destitute orphane. The boat was the property of a man, named Grady.

Two sail-boats foundered in the same gale of wind at Kildysart, but the crews were fortunately saved.

On the above day, also, a mil-boat foundered near the mouth of Askeaton river. The crew took to the mast head, where they clung, though requently washed by the waves, until a boat observed their danger. They were released, and conveyed in safet to hore.

A letter received by us, this day, from an officer of the 22d Regiment, dated Stoney Hill, Jamaica, the 27th of March, states, "The Regiment is very healthy, not one case of fever since our landing, and the officers and men in high spirits."
