The Magistrates are desired under pain of fine to return their Informations and Recognizances to the Crown Office, a week before the Commission Days.—And such Prosecutors and Witnesses as do not attend at the sitting of the Court on these Days will be liable to forfeit their Recognizances and will not obtain any order for their expences.

THE NAVY.

It appears from a return laid before Parliament, that the following were the number of Officers promoted between the 1st of Jan. 1826, and the 1st of January, 1827:—

One hundred and fifty-four Midshipmen to the rank of Lieut. Eleven of this number were promoted into death vacancies on Foreign stations. The senior Midshipman promoted had been 20 years in the service, and then he succeeded to a death vacancy; the junior seven years.—The number of Lieutenants promoted to the rank of Commander was 47; two of them to death vacancies. The senior Lieut. had held his rank 29 years, the junior not three years. The number of Commanders promoted to Captains was 19. The senior Commander held his rank 13 years, the junior 1 year. The number of Officers in the Royal Navy on the 1st of Jan. 1827, was—Admirals, 56—two employed; Vice-Admirals, 68—six employed; Rear-Admirals, 67—four employed; Captains 808—73 employed; Commanders 44—15 employed; Lieutenants, 3712—682 employed.—The promotions in the Royal Marine Corps were as follow; five Majors to be Lieut.-Colonels, 13 Captains to be Majors, 41 Lieutenants to be Captains, six gentlemen appointed to first commissions. Five Captains, 42 First-Lieutenants, and six Second Lieutenants, were brought from half to full-pay. Remaining on half-pay on the 1st of Jan. 1827:—two Major, 102 Captains, 248 First Lieutenants, and 204 Second Lieutenants—Total 550.

The annual accounts of revenue and expenditure presented to the House of Commons by the East India Company, show the effect upon the finances of India, produced by the Burmese war. In 1822-3, the overplus revenue in India, after paying the interest of debt, was £2,208,053. In 1825-6, the estimate surplus charge in India was £2,675,456. The Revenue has of late years somewhat declined. In 1822-3 it was upwards of 23 millions, in 1823-4, it was 21½ millions; in 1824-5, 20½ millions; 1825-6 estimated at 21 millions sterling. The charges in same years, 18½, 19, 20, and 22 millions, besides interest on debts, (in the last year £1,674,792, and the charges at St. Helena (from 120 to £110,000.) The war with the Burmese has, on the whole cost probably £10,000,000 or £12,000,000 sterling.

DEATHS.

On Monday morning, at Castletown, in this County, John Thomas, only son of John Waller, Esq., in the 37th year of his age. Brief as his days have been, they afforded sufficient time to develop the excellent qualities of his mind and heart; and the manner in which he discharged the various duties of his station assures us, that had it pleased the Almighty to allow him to have run a longer course he would have been a valuable public man, as he was an exemplary domestic character. Embued with a natural genius, highly improved by taste and cultivation—amiable and engaging manners—a genial warmth of heart—a refined sense of honor—nice and delicate feelings—and an ingenuous, disinterested spirit, admirably calculated to adorn and exalt the human character. In all the manifold relations of life, a principle of strict and undeviating rectitude distinguished the Magistrate and the Gentleman. As a resident landlord, a generous friend, and the natural protector and guardian of a grateful tenantry, his anxiety was ever alive to promote their welfare, happiness, and comfort. In the eventful year 1822, when the country was convulsed with disturbance and outrage, Mr. Waller was called to fill the dignified but arduous office of High Sheriff of this County, a trust which he executed to the satisfaction of his brother Magistrates, and to the advantage of the community. In society, his deportment was affable, yet modest and unpretending; in the domestic circle, tender and affectionate, while, in all his engagements, he was extremely accurate and punctual. Truth and virtue formed the basis of this noble and elevated character, and to him may be justly applied that beautiful passage from Job—

“When the ear heard him, then it blessed him; and when the eye saw him, it gave witness to him: because he delivered the poor that cried, and the fatherless, and him that had none to help him.”

Language is inadequate to convey an expression of the loud and general lamentation, with which the last sad intelligence was received in Pallis-Kerry, Castle-Town, and its neighbourhood. Cottages were deserted, and families hastened to the mournful scene, deploring, in the most heart-rending language, the premature loss of the kindest benefactor, friend, and landlord. The remains of this excellent Gentleman were interred this morning in the family vault at Castletown, followed by an immense cavalcade of gentry, and crowds of the peasantry attended from the most distant parts of the Country.

LONDON, BATH, BRISTOL, AND The West of England,
 BY THE IMPROVED

OLD-PASSAGE FERRY near CHEPSTOW
 THE best and most direct travelling to London, Bristol, Bath, and the West of England, is by way of the OLD-PASSAGE FERRY, which has recently been improved by the construction of handsome and convenient stone Piers, and the establishment of a Steam-Packet for the accommodation of the public in crossing the Severn at all states of the tide. A saving of thirteen miles is effected in the London road, by proceeding straight from the Old-Passage Ferry to the Cross-hands posting-house and thence to Chippenham, making two stages only instead of three, through Bristol and Bath to Chippenham. A considerable saving is also made by the road through Cross-Hands, Tetbury, Cirencester, Burford, and Oxford; and likewise by that through Wotton Under-edge, Cirencester, Abingdon and Henly: The last is the route of the New London and Chepstow direct Coach, which leaves the Beaufort Arms, Chepstow, every morning. The nearest road to Bath from the Old-Passage Ferry is, by a single stage, through Downend. The Bristol Coaches also leave the Beaufort Arms, Chepstow, every day by way of the Old-Passage Ferry. Besides its celebrated castle, bridge and rocks, Chepstow affords the opportunity of visiting Piercefield Walks, the views of Wyndcliff and Lantant, and the New Road cut through the rocks and woods of Wyndcliff to the beautiful ruins of Tintern Abbey on the banks of the Wye. There is a good Inn on each side of the Old Passage Ferry. The fares at the Ferry are generally reduced, notwithstanding the great expense of the improvements; and the fees for small boats are altogether abolished. To interest the boatmen in giving their best exertions for the accommodation of the public, they are entitled to gratuities according to the number of passengers they convey across the river; and to prevent the possibility of any contrary interest to occasion delay, the Directors of the Old Passage Ferry Association have separated the Ferry from the Inns, placed the Steam-Packet and other vessels under the management of a respectable Superintendent who has a corresponding interest with the boatmen, and made arrangements with the tenants of the Inns for encouraging every description of conveyance, for the convenience of the public in communicating with the Old-Passage Ferry on both sides.
