An armed party of ten men attacked the dwelling-
houses of the following persons, between the hours of six
and seven o'clock on Tuesday evening last, at Glencolloe,
near Newport:—Patrick Kelly's house burned to the
ground, and furniture, potatoes, plough, harrow, &c.
totally destroyed; William Clifford's dwelling-house,
furniture, and cow-house destroyed—they took from this
house a blunderbuss; Pat Clifford's cow-house burned;
Michael Clifford's cow-house and stable burned; James
Kelly and William Halloran's house burned, with their
entire furniture—they were partners, and have lost three
cows and a horse, which were shot. Mr. Pearce, the
Chief of Police, pursued the party for many miles, but
could not come up with them. This dreadful outrage is
attributed to a change in the tenancy of the lands, the
leases of the late occupiers having expired, and new-
comers taking possession.

This morning Ulyses M'Elligott, a fine young lad,
son of the late Mr. M'Elligott, of this City, classical
teacher, fell out of a boat near Shannon-quay, and was
drowned; the body was found a few hours after.

William Kenny, the labouring man who fell from St.
Munchin's Church, died in the Hospital, on Thursday,
of the injury he received. He has left a wife and four
young children unprovided for.

On Thursday, a bull, the property of Mr. Hornibrook,
of Rockfort, County Cork, gored the herdsman so dread-
fully, that he died in a few hours.

The total number of prisoners entered for trial on the
County Assizes calendar is eighty-four, of which number
seventeen are for murder, exclusive of several under the
general head of whiteboyism, firing with intent to kill,
burglary and robbery, violation, cow-strallog, and
other offences. Many of those cases, however, it is
gratifying to observe, are not of a recent date, and some,
especially the murders, having been perpetrated years ago.

Last Assizes, the County Calendar exhibited 171 names,
showing this Assizes a decrease of eighty-seven. In the
City, the number is pretty much as last.

The number of Nisi Prius cases for trial in County
and City, is greater than has been known for several
circuits.

Compared with last Spring Assizes, there has been a
decrease of £9,099, in the sum proposed to be levied on
the County for public works.

The Carlow Grand Jury have presented £7,000 for the
repairs of the County Gaol.

The following have been convicted at Carlow Assizes,
which terminated on Wednesday:—Richard Quin, Wil-
liam Hall, Mary Timmin, Mary Murphy, Philip Brian,
and James Murphy, all to be transported for seven years;
Catherine Byrne, and Eleonor Walsh, for burglary and

more than 700 Civil Bills were disposed of at the
Sessions, and the criminal business commenced
Thursday.

The Killarney Quarter Sessions ended on Sa-
turday after hearing 1,154 civil bill processes. Two
persons were convicted and sentenced to various
terms of imprisonment.

At Clonakilty Quarter Sessions, held last
evening, eleven appeal cases against the decision of the Magistrate
at Millbereen, for breaches of the Stamp Laws, in
John Brown, Esq. Inspector of Stamp Duties, the
Prosecutor, the convictions were affirmed.

At the late Sessions of Nenagh, three men were
guilty of assaulting the nightly watch of Clonmel,
and sentenced to be imprisoned a month, pay a fine
and to find bail.

On Wednesday, Mr John Nunan, butter
baker, was summoned before the Mayor of that
City, for having six casks at the weigh-
house, according to the 40th Geo. III sec. 10.

Mr Nunan deposed on oath the casks were of unseasoned
wood, and unmerchantable, adapted for the Limerick
market, but not for the West Indies, being
filled with pickle. The firkins were made in
County Limerick, and the Mayor inflicted the penalty
of £10 on each.

Another large quantity of light and bad bread
was seized by the Mayor and Market Jury
on Friday, for selling fraudulent measures, pints, quarts, &c. had
been detected and seized, from persons selling veal
and fruit.

The coopers of Cork have entered into a resolu-
tion not to make any country made firkins, for the butter
market of that City: If this resolution is persevered
in, the quantity of dry butter sold in Cork last
year was 100,000 firkins, and of pickled 45,000 firkins.
