This excellent woman, whose death it is our painful duty to announce, lived for many years on the confines of our County, where, in consequence of the death of Mr. Raymond, the superintendence of a large family devolved upon her in early life—a duty she discharged with all the feelings of a widow, and the affections of a mother; but the goodness of her heart was not confined to its immediate or maternal duties: the poor also became her orphans, as was exemplified in the years 1816 and 1817, (years of great distress,) when, exclusive of her private charities, she purchased and distributed large quantities of flag-seed, and at once gave a stimulus to industry, which effectually relieved the neighbouring poor. While her heart was thus employed, her house was always open to the traveller and the friend, who never left Riversdale without feeling that Irish hospitality had fixed its abode in that retired and sequestered spot. By her family such a mother must be lamented, and to her friends and society her death is an irreparable loss.
