Baron Pennefather opened the commission in Wexford, on Monday, and swore in the Grand Jury—The calendar is very heavy.

The Lord Chief Justice opened the commission at Laryboro', on Monday, and swore in the Queen's County Grand Jury. The calendar is very light. Sentence of death was recorded against Denis Murphy, for horse stealing.

The following ~~cases~~, situate in the Parish of Shandrum, Barony of Orrery and Kilmore, Co. Cork, were attacked by a party of insurgents, consisting of about twenty armed with guns, pistols, &c., on the night of Monday last:—James Simon's, of Glengarriff, was visited between 10 and 11 o'clock. Having first demanded entrance, and being refused, they broke the windows; the door having been then opened, they proceeded to commit several acts of violence, by beating Simon; and threw fire about the house, and threatened to burn it, if he did not employ a person of the name of Gorman, whom Simon had an occasion to discharge from his employment, some time before. They next went to a dairy-house belonging to Andrew Leary, at Shandrum, which they forcibly entered by breaking in the door. Having, on their entrance, enquired for Leary, who happened not to be in the house, they proceeded to commit the most violent acts of outrage, by spilling several keelers of milk, and dragging the milk-woman out of her bed, and flogging her in a barbarous manner; having then directed her to return to her bed, and being in the act of doing so, the men who stood at the door fired a shot in the direction she was proceeding, which fortunately missed her; they then placed sentinels at the door to keep in the inmates, whilst the remainder went to a field convenient to the house, where there were some calves, and most inhumanly killed two and wounded one, by stabbing and cutting them with either a scythe or sword.—The reason they alleged for this outrage is, Leary having resisted in giving a field, which was turned up by night for potatoe-gardens.

A man of very bad character, named Patrick Leary, from the neighbourhood of Shandrum, was executed at the last Assizes, for attacking houses. He was charged with the murder of a Mr. Noonan, at the commencement of the late disturbances.

We lament that we have occasion to state a wanton and sacrilegious outrage. On Tuesday last a number of persons attending a funeral to the Church-yard of Knockany, forced an entrance into the Church, knocked down the sister of the Sexton, who endeavoured to prevent them, broke open the organ, and tore out several of the pipes and otherwise materially injured it.

Seventeen three year old bullocks, the property of William Butler, Esq. of Bunahow, County Clare, were killed by lightning on Thursday evening, near Kilsenora.

A man, named Patrick Walsh, charged with being concerned in the horrible burning of the Sheas, at Tubber, has been arrested and committed to Clonmel gaol, by Capt. Drought, Chief of Police.

This day a young girl fell over the battlements of George's-quay, into the river, and would have been lost but for two or three men, who leaped in, and brought her safe to shore.

Thursday, Major Willcocks, Inspector-General of Police, reviewed the Constabulary Force of this County. Mr. Wilcocks examined the Policemen individually as to the performance of their duties, and questioned them as to having any complaints against their officers; he also stated that several reports had been made to him of private debts being contracted, and the difficulty the people had of getting paid, and said that it was disgraceful to a body of men who were so well paid themselves by Government, to allow poor trades-people and others to make such complaints, and warned them against getting into debt in future, as dismissal would positively be the result.
