LIMERICK ASSIZES.

At ten o'clock, on Saturday morning, the Lord Chief Justice sat in the City Court.

James Grady, was indicted for an attempt on the life of John Cosgrave, and, also, with an assault and rescue—upon the first indictment, through the counsel of the defendant and prosecutor, and found guilty of assault and rescue.

John Cosgrave, for stealing wearing apparel, the property of John Grady. The prisoner received an excellent verdict from two or three witnesses.

The members of the Jury, here is a girl with a hat, who is sworn to have stolen a hat, coat, and shoes.—(A laugh.)

John Cosgrave, for stealing a pocket-book and some other articles, the property of John Lynch, pleaded guilty.

John Cosgrave, and David Burke, for stealing 30lbs. of property of Catherine Peacocke.

John Cosgrave, an approver, sworn—Was at the house when the prisoners rapped at his door, and he went to go with them, saying, they wanted to go to Catherine Peacocke's house; he went, and they put a candle in Peacocke's window, and David Burke brought out four loaves of sugar to Pat. Cosgrave remained outside to watch; they got to Peacocke's house; it was about 12 and 1 o'clock at night; they got to witness' sister-in-law to pledge.

John Cosgrave—Would not come forward to prosecute the prisoners.

John Cosgrave, for further corroboration of this witness, and in the direction of his Lordship, the Jury acquitted the prisoners.

John Cosgrave, James Madigan, and Denis Magrath, and Denis O'Connor, and taking away his hat,

John Cosgrave deposed, that he was going home, by the way when he was attacked by the prisoners, who took away his hat, coat, and shoes.

John Cosgrave called, as a witness for the defence, John Cosgrave, the approver in the former case, and the Jury declared they could not believe in his story, and they were found guilty.

John Cosgrave, and Catherine Ryan, his wife, for stealing property of Michael Cahill—the Jury found the second not guilty.

John Cosgrave, for stealing two boots the property of John Cosgrave, not guilty.

John Cosgrave, and Catherine Quinn, for stealing property and house linen, the property of Catherine Peacocke and David Burke, guilty.

His Lordship resumed the criminal business yesterday, at the usual hour.

James Grady, a soldier of the 99th Regiment, was indicted for burglary and robbery in the house of Jane Cosgrave, on the 28th November last—the prisoner was then an inhabitant of the neighbourhood, and with the assistance of another person, broke into the house under pretence of looking for fire arms, they carried off a small box containing a 5l. bank note, and some frize—the prisoner was apprehended at Clare Castle, where it appears he had enlisted in the 99th regt. He had no counsel, and examined no witnesses for his defence—the jury found a verdict guilty—Death.

Mary Keen for the murder of Phillip Molony at Palmerstown, on the 10th of June—There was not a scintilla of evidence to support this case against the prisoner, and the Jury Acquitted her.

Thomas Shaughnessy for the murder of Mary Lloyd at Osborne's lane—No prosecution; Not Guilty.

Patrick, Thomas, William and Mary M'Namara, were indicted for the murder of Daniel Kelliher at Mungret; No evidence was adduced to sustain this prosecution, but the dying declaration of Kelliher, as communicated by Capt. Drought, and the Judge was of opinion, that as such it went beyond any dying declaration he ever heard; the deceased could only express his feeling by a simple affirmative or negative, yes or no, unable to qualify or explain what he meant to convey—Verdict, Not Guilty.

John Lyons, for stealing a window sash and glass, the property of Benjamin Furnell; guilty.

Johanna Cooke, for stealing house linen, the property of James Morgan, guilty.

Michael Keena, was indicted for the murder of John Connors, at the race course of Newcastle, the 25th Sept. last.—It appeared the prisoner and deceased were returning from the races, both drunk, when they jostled each other, they fought, and the deceased was kicked so badly in the abdomen, that he died in hospital a few days after—the jury found a verdict of manslaughter, and the prisoner was sentenced to imprisonment and hard labour for six months. He was tried on Saturday for assaulting and attempting to cut a woman's throat with a razor.

David Connors, was indicted for the murder of Darby Carty, by administering corrosive sublimate, when attending him for a venereal disorder—the unfortunate man had taken ten times more of this poisoning medicine than he should have done—he was apprised too late of the fatal error, by the prisoner, who is a man in humble life, and death was the consequence—verdict—not guilty.

His Lordship having finished the crown business in the City, repaired to the County Record Court, to try Nisi Prius cases.

Gubbins v. Rahilly and O'Brien.

This was an action of debt on a bond for £10 dated the 14th December 1824, passed by John Rahilly and Brien O'Brien, to Joseph Gubbins shoe-maker, as guardian of John Hogan an apprentice indented to plaintiff—The apprentice was alleged to have left his master without leave before his term of indenture had expired—and the action was brought against his securities—Verdict for plaintiff, £10 Irish and 6d costs.

Tuthill v Gabbett.—This very important case involving a right of public passage, by the south shore of Corbally bank, to St Thomas's Island, which right is alleged to have been invaded by defendant, inclosing the ground with a high wall and running a dam from the river. Plaintiffs' case was opened by Mr. Serjeant Gould, in a clear and luminous statement, and Mr. O'Connell stated the case for defendant in a powerful and eloquent speech.—At six o'clock, the Court adjourned to this day. A numerous bar of Lawyers is arranged on both sides. Conducting Agent for Plaintiff, Edward Sayers, Esq., and for Defendant, Thomas Leland, Esq. It is a Special Jury case.
