EXECUTION FOR MURDER.

On Monday, pursuant to their sentence, Patrick M'Namara and Patrick Grady were executed at the County Jail, the former for the murder of Bridget Molony, and the latter for the murder of Thomas Egan. Notwithstanding the excessive fall of rain which endured with scarcely any intermission, a crowd had been gathering in front of the prison, from eleven o'clock in the morning until half-past two in the afternoon, when a large mass of spectators had collected, composed equally of town and country people, but entirely confined to the lower order. When the signal was given, the two culprits were led from their cells, each supported by a Roman Catholic Clergyman, Rev. Messrs. O'Mealy and Furlong, to whose pious exhortations they evidently paid the closest attention. Humility and resignation were visible in their countenances and demeanour, and they moved towards the platform with a slow but firm step, undisturbed by the many inquisitive looks which surrounded them. At the foot of the platform they kneeled for some minutes, engaged in devout and earnest prayer,

...and then mounted the trap-door, still supported by the pastors, while the executioner was busied in his awful preparations. Patrick M'Namara, the pensioner, wore his usual working dress; he was a man about 47 years, and stood 5 feet 6 inches. Patrick Grady was a fine athletic young man, 26 years of age, and 5 feet 9 inches in height; he was attired in white flannel, vest and trousers, tied in front with black tape; on his back, between the shoulders, appeared the figure of a cross, worked in black tape, which had rather an extraordinary effect—they both behaved with firmness and composure, to the last moment, when they embraced affectionately, and took leave of the attending Clergymen, but without making any profession of their guilt or innocence. On a given signal, the trap-door fell, and they were launched into eternity; the shock was violent, and a feeling of terror ran over the crowd; a movement was apparent in the assemblage, accompanied by audible ejaculations of mercy to the Divine Being. Their sufferings were not protracted, nature quickly yielded to the conflict, and they died without much struggle. The bodies were left hanging for 35 minutes, and were then cut down and conveyed between a military escort, to the County Infirmary, for dissection. The multitude then quietly dispersed, Patrick M'Namara has left a widow and five children, who were to see and take leave of him in jail, the day before his death. This unhappy man admitted his guilt, on returning from Court, on the evening of his sentence. Patrick Grady has also left a young widow and one child, who also took a last affectionate farewell of him in prison. There is something very singular in the fate of these wretched men, especially the former—Patrick M'Namara's brother was hanged 19 years ago, for whiteboyism; the year after he murdered in revenge the woman on whose evidence that brother was found guilty and executed; he then fled the Country, changed his name, and entered the army, fought in the Peninsula, and was wounded, was discharged a pensioner from the 66th Regiment, returned to Ireland, and lived for the last ten years in Tipperary, where he bore a good character. In April last he was recognised by the son-in-law of the woman he murdered, tried, and convicted at the Assizes, principally on his testimony, and executed on Monday for that murder, committed 18 years since. If ever the finger of an All-wise and Almighty Providence, was apparent in human affairs, it surely was remarkable in this circumstance, and the evil does should tremble at the prospect of divine wrath, which identifiably awaits on wicked deeds.
