Michael Cornelly was executed this day, at the County Gaol, pursuant to his sentence. His conduct, at the scaffold, was marked by a proper feeling of penitence and resignation. Of the man's guilt there is no doubt.

On Saturday evening, the dwelling house of the Rev. John Murphy, P. P. of Rath, Co. Clare, was burned to the ground, but the greater part of the furniture was saved. The conflagration originated in a spark from the chimney lighting on the thatched roof.

Patrick Allen, a young man subject to epilepsy, was suffocated in a shallow stream, near Gaurus, Co. Clare, on Sunday last.

Last week, John Cox, Esq. Coroner, held two inquests one on the body of Mary Connell, at Newcastle in this county; the jury returned a verdict, of died by intoxication.—The other at Rathkeale, on the body of Patrick Donnell, 18 months old, who died of a ball from a pistol in the hands of another child, who inadvertently snapped it. Verdict, accidental death.

On Thursday last, Mr. Cox, held an inquest at Ballygran, on the body of Denis Deely, who died by a fall from his horse. Verdict, accidental death.

On Wednesday, a fine little girl about three years of age, belonging to a poor boatman named Cunningham, in Kilrush, was killed by a car rolling over her head.

Thursday morning, the post-boy from Kildysart, discovered that fire had been placed in a thatched house in the suburbs of Ennis, belonging to Serjeant Grant, of the Clare Staff—he immediately gave an alarm, and fortunately the inmates were enabled to extinguish the fire and preserve the house. Had it not been discovered it is impossible to say how far the conflagration might have extended as the house is in the midst of thatched cottages.

Robert G. Maunsell, Esq., of this City, is appointed Landing Surveyor and Surveyor of Ware-houses, at this port, vice Alexander Shawe, Esq. who proceeds to London. Mr. Maunsell is succeeded at Galway, in the same department, by Mr. Smithers, an English gentleman.

On Saturday last, Major-General Sir Charles Doyle inspected the detachment of the 58th Regiment quartered in Clonmel. The military evolutions of the men, together with their interior economy, gave the gallant General much satisfaction. The 58th are intended for foreign service, preparatory to which the head-quarters are, we understand, expected in Clonmel in a few days.

Monday, the 4th Royal Irish Dragoons were inspected on Lodmore-Plat, near Winchester, by Major-General Sir Hussey Vivian, K. C. B. when the General expressed his unqualified approbation of the appearance of that fine corps.

The light infantry of the 37th Regiment, under Captain Wood, have moved from the New Barracks to the Castle Barracks, where both Rank companies, with band and colours, are now stationed.

The 12th Royal Lancers, who have acted as the Body Guard of the Princess Regent of Portugal, are now relieved in that duty by the 10th Royal Hussars.
