

## The Limerick Chronicle

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 26.

A man named Richard Roche was killed in an affray, at Shanagolden, on Sunday evening last, by a blow of a tongs. The murderer has fled, but he is well known to the Police, who are on the alert for his apprehension. His name is Nicholas Walsh, a school-master. The deceased was pound-keeper of Shanagolden.

Denis Kennelly, glover and breeches-maker, died suddenly, on Sunday night, in the City Marshalsea. The Mayor held an inquest on Monday, when a verdict of death by apoplexy was returned.

On Friday last, a female, in the service of the Rev. Mr. M'Namara, P. P. of Shanagolden, was violently thrown from a cart, and killed on the spot. The melancholy accident is attributable to the horse taking fright.

The Mayor, on Monday, held an inquest at the County Infirmary, on the body of Malachy Ryan, whose head was fractured at Murnane, on the 2d instant, by the blow

of a stone from Michael Nicholas, of Purstane.

The professional Gentleman examined on this occasion was of opinion, the deceased died of disease of the lungs; but the Jury found that he came to his death by the fracture in the skull, accelerated by the disease in the lungs.

On Friday night, a man named Murnane, was found dead in his bed, at Robertstown, in this County.

Last night, a number of persons were assembled at a wake, in the room of a house, opposite the Castle barrack. The great pressure on the flooring proved too much for the supporters, and the entire gave way with a loud crash; several of the company were injured, but not dangerously, by the fall.

On Monday seven convicts under rule of transportation were forwarded from the City Jail, to the Penitentiary in Dublin.

There was a rumour in Cork yesterday, of Thomas Ware, Esq. of Ballynockin, near Mallow, having been fired at by an armed bandit, on Sunday night last, between nine and ten o'clock, on his return from Woodfort, where he had spent the evening with his son.

In the second Revenue case at Fermoy, on Monday, a penalty of 200l. in each count was inflicted. The Commission still continues its sittings.

A Steam-Packet Company in Liverpool, have offered to place a regular trader between that port and Tralee, on being reimbursed half the expenses of outfit.

The Inspector of Police has issued the Lord Lieutenant's order to Mr. Balmer, C. C., to dismiss Sub-Constables James Barry, and John Ashbury, stationed at Ballynecy, in this County; the former for allowing his carbine to be taken from him on the high road, by a country man, and the latter for absenting himself from his party while upon duty.

A very improper practice is occasionally pursued by idle passengers, on the Mail Coach, from here to Tralee. These gentry indulge themselves in pelting with eggs and other missiles, not only the humble cottiers, but respectable foot travellers, without, of course, the chance of a retort. Such conduct is shameful, and should be discountenanced by the driver and guard.
