Lord Ennismore were privately interred at St. Finn Barr's, on Thursday. No election has yet been made from any quarter to start a Candidate. It is possible that things may continue for some days, as the candidates who will of necessity be mixed together, and are so removed from each other, that a free and frequent intercourse cannot be had. 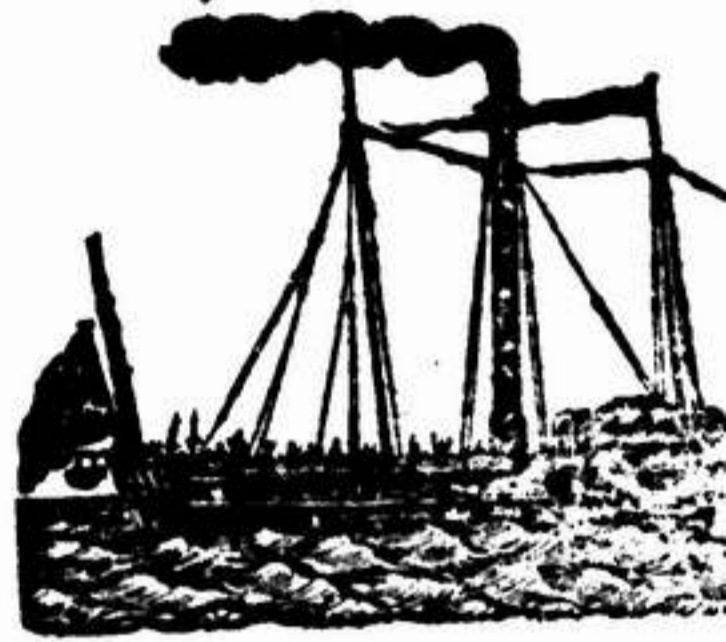
