James Hickey, an old pensioner from the Royal Navy, was found dead yesterday morning, in a cellar at the end of Bridge-street. He had retired to bed the night before with his son, another pensioner, under the influence of liquor, and in the morning was observed a lifeless corpse. The Mayor held an inquest in the course of the day, when a verdict "Died by intoxication" was returned.

A wretched looking female, apparently about 50 years of age, was, on Saturday morning last, found dead on the road near Ballinvira; two evenings before, when in a very languishing state, she mentioned to a poor family in the neighbourhood, who gave her a night's lodging, that she had come from the County Kildare.

On Friday evening, six stacks of corn, a rick of hay, and some bee-hives, were maliciously set on fire and consumed to ashes, near the village of Skull, County Cork.

On Tuesday night, three sheep, the property of Mr. Keating, were stolen off his farm near Woodroose, Tipperary.

The Police of Carrick-on-Suir, under Mr. Singleton, discovered in a house in that town, a case of pistols loaded, a cut down gun, a bag of balls, a parcel of skeleton keys, with steel and flint tied to them, and some blacking for the face.

On Wednesday night some malicious villains attempted to burn the house of a person of the name of Morrissy, on the lands of Knockbrett, near Mobarna, County of Tipperary. Fire was applied to three places at the same time; fortunately some persons, returning from the fair of this town, saw the fire sufficiently in time to give the alarm, and assist in saving the house from destruction.

Wednesday night, in a rencontre between the Police and the people at Park, near Templemore, one man was shot of the latter, and two were wounded.

On Tuesday evening, as a man and his wife, of the name of Sullivan, were on their way from Mitchelstown to the fair of Alacross, near Kildorrery, sitting in a car on which were two tierces of porter, they had proceeded but a very short way, when the horse took fright, and they were both dashed out of the car; the man came with great violence against Lord Kingston's demesne wall, and the wheel of the car going over his body, he was killed on the spot; the woman was also severely injured, but it is hoped she will recover. He was a well-conducted man, and carried on the Public business in Mitchelstown.
