In cases of Turnpike Roads, Notices must be given three times in the Months of August, September, October, or November, or either of them, in one and the same Newspaper, printed within each County or Place through which the Road runs; or if there be none so printed, then in the Newspaper of some near or adjoining County; and also on the doors of the Session Houses of each and every such County or Place, at the Michaelmas, or the next following Quarter Sessions, each Notice describing the parishes through which the Road runs. And if to amend or alter any existing Road Acts, then the Acts to be amended, and any intended increase of Toll, must also be mentioned in each and every such Notice. Also when the application is intended to be made for making any new Turnpike Road, or for altering the line of any existing Road, a Map or Plan of such Road, or intended alteration, upon a scale of not more than five, nor less than three inches to a mile, must be deposited for public inspection at the office of the Clerk of the Peace of every County through which such Road is intended to be carried, or such alteration made, on or before the 30th day of November next, which Map or Plan shall describe the line of such intended Road or alteration, and the Lands through which the same is intended to be carried, and shall be accompanied with a Book of Reference, containing a List of the Names of the Owners or reputed Owners and Occupiers of such Lands respectively; and that Duplicates of the same be made for the two Houses of Parliament, together with estimates of expence of such undertaking (in cases where where provision is intended to be made for raising money to defray such expence,) such estimate to be signed by the person or persons making the same; and if such money is proposed to be raised by subscription, then duplicate accounts must be made of the money subscribed for that purpose, and the names of the subscribers, with the sums subscribed by them respectively. Application must almost be made to the several Owners and Occupiers of Land through which any Road is intended to be carried, or alteration made, and duplicate lists must be made of the names of such Owners and Occupiers, distinguishing which of them have assented to or dissented from such intended road or alteration, or are neuter in respect thereof, and the Plan must be shewn to such Owners and Occupiers respectively, at the time of such application. One set of these several documents must accompany the petition to the House of Commons, to be lodged in the proper Office, previously to the petition being presented.

In cases of Application for Bills for paving, cleansing, lighting, (whether by Gas or otherwise), or for improving any City, Town or place, or for erecting or improving Town Halls or Market places, or for repairing or rebuilding Churches, or for enclosing, draining, or improving Lands, or for making Ferries or Docks, or for amending any Acts for such purposes, the like Notices as for Roads must be given in the Newspapers and on the Sessions Houses Doors, together with additional Notices in these cases, to be affixed on the several Church Doors of the several parishes, three successive Sundays in August, September, October, or November, or either of them.

For making any Out, Canal, Reservoir, or Aqueduct for supplying any place with Water; or for making or erecting any Bridge, Ferry, Dock, Pier, Port or Harbour, all the Directions as in the case of Turnpike Roads with respect to Notices, Plans, Estimates, and other particulars, are applicable; and that the plans in these cases, must also describe the Brooks and Streams
