Richard Willcocks, Esq. Inspector General of Police, has
retired from the arduous duties of his office, after nearly
thirty years service to the public. In testimony of the
approbation of Government, his Excellency the Lord
Lieutenant was on Saturday pleased, as a special mark of
favor, to confer the honor of Knighthood on this very
meritorious and active officer.

It is painful to learn, that the severe gale of last Wed-
nesday evening has produced its victims in the Shannon,
a small sail boat having swamped on its way to Carriga-
foyle, from Kilrush, and seven men unfortunately
perished. Some of the bodies were thrown up by the
waves next morning on the Ballylangford strand. It is
further stated, that two women were on board, but of this
no further confirmation has been received.

On Friday an inquest was held by James Bennett,
Esq. Coroner, on the body of a man named John Her-
bert, who was way-laid, and most barbarously beaten,
some nights previous, near the fair-green of Hospital.
The inquest was adjourned till the following day, in
order that the body of the deceased should undergo
Surgical examination. Accordingly, Surgeon Franklin,
jun., was sent by Mr. Vokes, C. M. P., who, upon
examination, found that an extensive fracture of the skull
caused his death. The Jury found a verdict of wilful
murder against two men, named Morony, and a man
named O'Brien, against whom warrants were immediately
issued by Joseph Gubbins, Esq. of Kilrush.
