Another disgraceful outrage was committed at Drew's Court, in this County, on Wednesday night last, similar in its nature to the forcible abduction of the Widow Cowie, from her father's house, and in the same neighbourhood, a short time previous. A band of ruffians, armed with naked scythes, attacked the dwelling house of James Leahy, a comfortable farmer, near Drew's Court, and made an entry by the thatched roof, baving been unable to force the doors. They immediately revealed their intentions, by seizing and dragging from under the protection of her father's house, and in spite of the cries of her family, Ellen, the daughter of Leahy, a girl of 17 years of age, whom they succeeded, in spite of every obstacle, in carrying off to the County Cork, and have not since been heard of. A brother of the unfortu nate girl, assisted by some of his neighbours, attempted a rescue, but in vain; he was driven back, and two of the party continued sentry at the door. How deplorable is the state of the country, when an outrage of so peculiarly infamous and aggravated a character is committed in a populous neighbourhood, and how torturing to the feelings of her afflicted family and friends.
