Colonel O'Grady retired amidst shouts of applause from every part of the Court. Mr. Massey Dawson did not visit the Court this day nor yesterday, and none of his friends attempted to address the freeholders in his behalf.

The Election is virtually at an end, and Colonel O'Grady's return may be counted on as matter of certainty. The County is absolutely exhausted, unless in one barony, and the force to be polled in that is unable to approach Colonel O'Grady's majority. To-morrow at least, seven of the baronies will be closed up altogether, as the law provides that unless twenty freeholders poll in a booth after the fourth day of Election, and that in one day, the booths must shut up, and no more voting allowed.

Up to yesterday evening when the poll ceased, the exact number of Freeholders who polled in all the baronies of the County was 1451, for both Candidates, as allowed by the High Sheriff and his Assessor.

We understand that a wager of £500, made by a Noble Peer deeply concerned in this election, with a relative of the candidate first on the poll, is likely to be lost by his Lordship. Other bets, to a large amount, will be won by the supporters of Colonel O'Grady, as the opposite side were quite sure of success, and as much as three to one were given and taken in many instances.

*Twelve o'Clock, Saturday.*

The Poll is exceedingly languid, and an arrangement has just been made between the Candidates to consume only one hour in polling a tally of five at either side in any booth. Every thing proceeds in quiet both in and outside the Court, and there is no interruption to the Poll.

After all the alarm felt for the apprehended defection of the tenantry, it is remarkable they did not desert their landlords, but voted generally with them. In the whole County there were not twenty exceptions to this rule.

*Half-past Two.*

The Conducting Agent of Mr. Massey Dawson has just come into Court and withdrawn all his Sub-Agents. Colonel O'Grady continues to bring up his voters.

Tar barrels are burning in all directions—the utmost peace and regularity pervade the City. Nothing but cheering and huzzing.

*Four o'Clock*

The High Sheriff has announced that he will keep the booths open until Monday; of course the Colonel will not be declared until that day.

*Six o'Clock.*

The High Sheriff has just declared this day's Poll—for O'Grady, 109, Massey Dawson, 22. Majority, 87. Majority on the Gross Poll, for Colonel O'Grady, 210.

Colonel O'Grady thanked the electors in a brilliant speech. The Court was adjourned to Monday next.

Tuesday, the Cork Mail Coach did not arrive here until four o'clock, in consequence of a break down, between Bruff and this City. Fortunately none of the passengers were injured.

The Mail Bags from Dublin, which were left at Roscrea, and which should have arrived here at nine o'clock, on Wednesday morning, did not reach our post-office until one in the afternoon, by the Birr stage coach.

Thursday night the Police of Castle-Connell detected a man of the name of Rinsellan, from this City, who had stolen a quantity of linen and other articles from persons along the Mail Coach road, near Sallymount.

On Wednesday evening, one of the privates of the 60th Regt., on duty at the City Gaol, fell from the trap, a distance of 30 feet to the base, and, miraculously to say, was not injured.
