We have the following very painful statement from a Liverpool Correspondent :- " A very distressing aceitient occurred here vesterday morning, by which, it is feared, four lives have been lost. A host crossing toward the lower part of the Mersey, having on board two gentlemen from one of the Dublin stramers, with two boatmen, was ran foul of, and upset by a large brig going down the river, under a heav; press of sail. The surf being exceedingly high, before assistance could be given, three of the unfortunate persons, two bestmen and one gertleman, were drowned; the other gentleman, who had made great exertion in awimming, was picked up by a boat, from the vessel which caused the accident, and taken on board the ship; it is not known whether alive or 'dead, as he was perceived to have sunk before they picked him up. The vessel proceeded on her voyage without landing the body ; it is supposed they were afraid of being detained in consequence of the occurrence. It has been ascertained that the names of the gentlemen were Watson and Molloy. The person drowned is a low sized fat man about 50 years of age, dressed in black; the other appeared tall, and were a drab top coat. It is supposed, by persons who wirnessed the accident, that if proper means were used on board the ship, the latter may have been restored to animation "

4th of January, in the 88th year of his age, the Hon. Sir John Johnson, Knight and Baronet, Superintendent. General and Impector-General of Indian Affairs, in British North America, and a member of the Legislative Council of that Province. The greater part of Sir John Johnston's life was spont in the service of his Severeign, having commenced at the early age of 13 years, when he served as a Volunteer under the command of his father Bir William Johnson, at the battle of Lake George, on the 8th September, 1755, when the French army under the command of Baron Dieskaw, was defeated, and the General taken prisoner, for which service Sir William Johnson, their Major-General, was created a Baronet, and received £5000. - Sir John was Kulghted by his Majesty during the life time of his father, and at the commencement of the American Revolution he abandoned his very extensive estate in the then province of New York, and with about 700 Tollowers chiefly his tenants, proceeded from Johnson-ball through the wilderness, and succeeded after enduring great privation in reaching Canada, and joined his Majesty's forces-he shortly after spiced a Regiment, consisting of two battalions, of which he was appointed Colonel, with the rank of Brigadier General, and continued to serve with distinction until the terminstion of the contest, when he was appointed to the office which he held at the time of his death, and although he attained to an age beyond the ordinary duration of life, The Albion, and Lady Gordon, from Tralee, have his loss will be long and most seriously lamented by those who had the best opportunity of appreciating the kindness The Quebec Packet and Ann, from this port, have and generosity of his disposition. Mr. Steven, Chaplain to the Forces, and after the ceremony descended by St. Vincegt-street and New Market, to the landing on the river side, where a boot awaited to convey the body across the river, for the purpose of interment in the family vault on Mount Johnson; before the boat left the shore, Lasau Tf Conwarisaw, a very old Iroquous Chief addressed the Indiana in a speech, which we are informed expressed the satisfaction of the orator in perceiving that they so very unanimously and willingly came on the present occasion to testify their great respect for the character of so good a father to the red children, (as he who made the house to tremble) the title given to the late Baronet by the Indiane, been to them the sorrow he felt that they could not accompany the remains of their beloved warrior to his last resting place, and the unfeigned regret which he and all the Indians experienced at attending the funeral of so good a man-he concluded by hoping, that all near him, would imitate the character and virtues of the decrased, so that at their interment they raight likewise call forth the regret present.
