Yesterday a Presentment for a Road from Croom to Charleville, which is considered to be one of the greatest improvements undertaken in the County for some years past, was traversed.

The City Grand Jury granted two pounds ten shillings to Thomas Gorman, the watchman of St. Michael's Parish, who so resolutely apprehended Nolan, whose conviction appears in the Assizes intelligence

Yesterday morning our Assizes ended. In both County and City fourteen are left for execution, and twenty-six for transportation. The conclusion of the Assizes intelligence shall appear on Saturday.

Yesterday afternoon, Baron Pennefather and Mr. Sergeant Blackburne, left this City for the seat of the Knight of Glin, the County High Sheriff. This day they proceed for Tralee, where the Assizes commence to-morrow.

Before leaving town, Judge Blackburne left a respite for Mary Murphy, who had been sentenced for execution this day.

Laurence Lynch and John Dunworth were executed at half-past three o'clock this day, for the murder of Walter Bourke, at Ballinabinch. An immense multitude attended to witness the execution. The culprits, both strong, young men, ascended the scaffold dressed in white flannels, and carrying large crucifixes. They had the spiritual assistance of two Roman Catholic Clergymen, the Rev. Messrs. Holahan and Burke. Lynch turned round to the spectators and protested most earnestly his utter innocence of the murder of Walter Bourke—that he slept in a house 8 miles distant the same night, and that he had never known or seen Mr. Murphy, unless in the goal this Assizes. He said he forgave his enemies. Dunworth spoke then, and declared he was innocent, and forgave all the world. They both prayed most fervently, and were launched into eternity, invoking the mercy of their Saviour.

After hanging the usual time, their bodies were removed to the Infirmary for dissection.

The public are much indebted to Mr. Dickson for the prosecution and conviction of the persons who have been robbing him, and who had been long abusing the confidence of a benevolent gentleman, besides using the worst artifices to corrupt a young apprentice for the purpose of plundering his master. Had those persons been enabled to persist in their infamous career, and were it not for the fortunate expose of their criminal practices, there is no saying how much our fellow citizens might have suffered in loss of property, or how many young men would have forfeited a promising character thro' their evil influence. Their house was much frequented by adults, and the vocal powers of the proprietors added to the enticement.

Michael Connell, now under sentence of death for the violation of Mary Ryan, is likely to have his life saved. His Counsel proffered evidence to contradict the Prosecutrix, which Sergeant Gould and Mr. Woulfe objected to, as proving a collateral fact. The Counsel for the prisoner, Mr. Holwell Walsh, denied that it was a collateral fact, and even admitting that it were, he insisted that it was relevant to the issue. The Learned Judge (Blackburne) thought the evidence legal.
