Lynch turned to the spectators and protested most earnestly against the execution of the murder of Walter Bourke—use 8 miles distant the same night, and was known or seen at the execution, unless in the person of John Dunworth. He said he forgave his enemies, and declared he was innocent of the murder. They both prayed most fervently, and launched into eternity, invoking the aid of the Holy Spirit.
