We are concerned to announce the death of Joseph Fisher, Esq. at his seat Richmond, near this City, after a very few days illness. Mr. Fisher was many years a principal of one of the first mercantile houses in Limerick, and universally esteemed as a man of strict probity.— He was a Director of the Irish Provincial Bank in this City, and Treasurer to the Wexley Bridge Commissioners, and the County Infirmary.

Sir Henry Hardinge, K. C. B. who, it is stated, is the new Irish Secretary, is a Colonel in the Army, lost an arm at Waterloo, has filled the office of Secretary at War with general satisfaction—is Member for the City of Durham—married in 1821, the widow Jones, sister of the Marquis Londonderry. The Colonel was a friend to the Marquis in his affair with Mr. Batters, and also to the Duke of Wellington with Lord Winchelsea.

The late Baron Lord Waterpark, Richard Cavendish, F. S. A. of Waterpark in the County Cork, a Peer of Great Britain, who died suddenly in London on Wednesday last, was born on the 13th July, 1765, and was son of the late Sir Henry Cavendish, succeeded to the title on the death of his mother, daughter of Richard Bradshaw, Esq. In August 1789, he married the daughter of Thomas Cooper, Esq. of Cooper's Hill, County Kildare, by whom he had Henry Richard, of the East India Company, George, Captain Royal Navy, Rev. Augustus Frederick, Rev. Thomas, Mrs. Philips, Anna, Mrs. Taylor, and Catherine. He is succeeded by his eldest son Lieutenant-Colonel Henry Cavendish, of the King's Stafford Militia, born 9th Nov. 1793.

The Roman Catholic inhabitants of St. Mary's assembled at the Parish Chapel last Sunday, and unanimously adopted a series of resolutions, condemnatory of the increase of taxation upon Irish Spirits and Stamps.

The inhabitants of St. John's Parish, of every religious and political persuasion, meet by requisition to-morrow, to petition the Legislature against the imposition of additional taxes.

The greatest and most important meeting of the Citizens of Cork, ever remembered, was held on Saturday at the Court House, the Mayor in the chair, to petition Parliament a second time against the projected taxes upon Irish Spirits and Stamps. Samuel Lane, Esq. President of the Committee of Merchants, addressed the Court in proposing a resolution that the certain ruin of the landed, mercantile and manufacturing interests of Ireland would result from the meditated increase of taxation, and urging upon the Irish members the duty they owed their constituents in such a crisis. Gerald Callaghan, Esq. suggested a personal appeal to the Duke of Wellington, and expressed himself satisfied of the pernicious tendency of the taxation scheme. Captain Ponsonby, R. N. declared it was perfectly useless to remonstrate with such a man as the Duke of Wellington—That personage had been heard to say, if the hairs of his head knew what was passing in his mind, he would shave them off! (cheers and laughter.) After considerable debate, a series of spirited resolutions were unanimously carried.

The inhabitants of Mallow assemble this day to petition against the new taxes, besides all the towns and principal villages in the County Cork, which meet immediately on the same subject.
