The late Baron Lord Waterpark, Richard Cavendish, F. S. A. of Waterpark in the County Cork, a Peer of Great Britain, who died suddenly in London on Wednesday last, was born on the 13th July, 1765, and was son of the late Sir Henry Cavendish, succeeded to the title on the death of his mother, daughter of Richard Bradehaw, Esq. In August 1789, he married the daughter of Thomas Cooper, Esq. of Cooper's Hill, County Kildare, by whom he had Henry Richard, of the East India Company, George, Captain Royal Navy, Rev. Augustus Frederick, Rev. Thomas, Mrs. Philips, Anna, Mrs. Taylor, and Catherine. He is succeeded by his eldest son Lieutenant-Colonel Henry Cavendish, of the King's Stafford Militia, born 9th Nov. 1793.
