The Act now in progress through Parliament, for fur- ther facilitating summary proceedings before Magistrates in Ireland, enacts that Lawyers and Solicitors must be heard in all cases requiring investigation before them at Sessions or elsewhere.

Monday evening, a fine little boy about six years of age, fell into the river on the North Strand, and was

observed. This fatality is ascribed to the neglected state of the parapet wall which the tide has levelled in many places. The body was found soon after by a fisherman.

Mary M-Namara, the young woman whose head was fractured by a stone in the riot near Baal's Bridge last Sunday week, died since of the wound in the County Infirmary. This young female was innocently passing at the moment when a furious horde of both sexes were pelting each other with those deadly missiles always em- ployed by vulgar and disorderly persons. She received a blow of a large stone on the head, and fell senseless to the ground. The combatants dispersed soon after, and death followed the fracture. The Mayor held an inquest on the body, but tho' it is believed the homicide is known to several, yet no evidence could be procured to implicate the guilty. How criminal in those who are cognizant of the outrage, and how disgraceful to reflect, that human life may be sacrificed in the streets of Limerick on the Sabbath, in the presence of many, yet that the agent of violent death stalks away with impunity.

The Office of Messrs. Roy & Co. Brewers, at John's- Gate, was robbed on Sunday night of several rolls of copper money. A man who had been discharged from the concern a week before, is in custody on suspicion of having effected the robbery.

The mutilated body of an infant was found on Mon- day last floating in the river near the fields at Court- brack. An inquest was held by the Mayor on Tuesday.

Catherine Welsh, a sixth of the convicts who broke from the City Gaol, is taken at Gort, where the Police arrested her on charge of shoplifting. A warrant was being made out for her committal to Galway gaol, when she with much sang froid told them there was no occa- sion for sending her so far into the heart of Connaught, when she was one of those prisoners who had escaped from Limerick gaol. This unexpected avowal imme- diately altered her route to this City, and she is now fast locked in her old habitation.

All the convicts in Ennis, amounting to eleven, under sentence of transportation to Botany Bay, arrived here on Monday, under an escort of the 90th Regiment and Police, and yesterday were forwarded to Cork. They are all remarkably well looking healthy men. Six of them were originally sentenced to be hanged.

The Forta transport which sailed from Cork for New South Wales, has on board 100 female convicts, besides the wives and children of 28 free settlers.
