The streets of Clonmel are paraded every day by detachments of the King's Dragoon Guards, while the election is pending—Popular resentment runs alarmingly against the late County Members—Mr. Wyse, is the general favourite with the middling and lower classes.

At Maryborough Election Sir Henry Parnell was proposed and seconded by George Evans and William Hamilton, Esqrs.; Sir Charles H. Coote, by Henry Smith and Charles White, Esqrs. Mr. Cassidy, of Monastereven, the distiller, declared, that if he had not been satisfied by the professions of the candidates, he would have announced himself to the freeholders for the representation of the County.

At the County Meath Election, Sir Marcus ~~Bon-~~ville was proposed and seconded by the Hon. Mr. Preston and John Pratt Winter, Esq. Lord Killeen by Sir H. Mereyth and Anthony Blackburn, Esq. Sir Marcus declared that he and his sons never received 6d. from Government, he was willing to support an Absentee tax. Lord Killeen avowed himself a friend to Parliamentary Reform, he would support economy and retrenchment in the state, but God forbid he should give a continued opposition to Government.
