 Doctor Franklin, jun. one of the Commissioners, successfully vindicated the board from any suspicion of improper or unworthy motives in their public duty.  
 Mr Rice now addressed the Chair in a long speech. He attacked an article in last number of this Chronicle, apprising the inhabitants of the attempt made by certain noble, wealthy, and influential absentee proprietors of land in the Liberties to impose an encroachment of taxation on the parish, but the correspondence read at the meeting most effectually substantiated that intelligence, so that apprehension was not groundless or chimerical, as Mr. R. termed it. The concluding part of Mr Rice's address manifestly increased the suspicions which his auditors entertained that he is absolutely better aware of the proceedings at work to carry a new Bill for increasing taxation, or remodelling the present local Act, than the parishioners or even the Commissioners themselves are cognizant of. So strong was this sentiment at the meeting, that a question put by Mr Morgan to ascertain Mr Rice's impression on the point of the taxation, was not replied to. Mr. Rice sought to alarm the parishioners by describing very industriously the efforts that would be made by the Liberties to carry their project, and entered into a defence of Lords Clare, Lansdowne, and Limerick, the latter of whom he asserted did not possess a single acre of land in the Liberties!  
 Mr. S. Dickson urged the necessity of coming to a resolution at once upon the subject of taxation. (Hear.)  
 At this advanced hour we are, of course, unable to report at full length; but the question was eventually put by the Chairman, and carried by universal acclamation, against any encroachment whatever of taxation upon the Parish.

Yesterday the honor of Knighthood was conferred by the Lord Lieutenant on Alderman Skottowe, Mayor of Waterford.

A letter received in this City by Mr George Osborne from his son at Brussels, gives further intelligence of the terrible calamities in that City. The Dutch troops entered, 5,000 strong, under Prince Frederick, and after four days fighting with the inhabitants were compelled to retreat, minus 5,000. Thousands of volunteers were pouring in from the surrounding districts.

Mr Rice, M.P. presided yesterday at a special meeting of the Sick and Indigent Room-Keepers' Society in the Commercial-Buildings. It was painful to observe by the very scanty attendance, how very little interest this valuable charity excites in the public mind. The funds will not support the Institution another week, if the wealthy and benevolent don't exert themselves in its behalf.

The Magistrates of Meath have now decided against the appointment of a Specially Magistrate in that County—A reinforcement of Police, under an active Chief Constable, is ordered to Upper and Lower Kells.

Mr. Patrick Lalor of Tinnakill, Abbeyfeiz, is a candidate for the office of Secretary to the County Grand Jury, vacated by the death of Mr Budds.

Rockfort House, within a few miles of Nenagh, the residence of John Wolf, Esq. was accidentally burnt, on Monday night, together with all the adjoining offices.

Informations have been ordered at Rathkeale Petty Sessions against Michael Hurley, of Newbridge, who, it appeared, in defending his house, (as stated in our last,) was opposing a person who had the execution of a civil process against his property.

One hundred and nine freeholders have given notice of registry at Tralee Sessions this month. In this number are six 50l freeholders, thirty-four 20l freeholders, and the remainder 10l freeholders.

No less than three hundred and fifty freeholders have given notice of registry at Ennis Quarter Sessions, the 23d of this month. Nine-tenths of the number are for 10l qualifications, and the great body is from the barony of Tulla, a strong hold of the Dromoland family.

Lord Lansdowne has become a patron of the Cow Pock Institution, Catherine-street, where 56 children have been vaccinated during the last month.

Mr. Patrick Duggan, of Rathkeale, on the 5d of September, was admitted Member of the Royal College of Surgeons in London, having previously obtained his diploma in Medicine from the Lying-in Hospital, Dublin.

Paul Cadmore, Esq. of Ballycogh, last March planted a spot of ground, 40 feet by 13 1/2, with potatoes, which he dug out this week. The produce was 55 stone. The potatoes were set in thirteen drills, seven potatoes to each drill. Forty potatoes were under a single stalk, and averaged one pound each, some weighed two pounds!

The Rev. Pryce Pascoeke acknowledged the receipt of even shillings and sixpence from a Lady, for the use of the Widows of St. George's Alms House.
