to Mr. Rait's house, after having  
dined with his brother, Mr. Sylvester Rait, near the  
village of Rode. The party were fired at out of a field,  
and Mr. Cheyne, dreadfully wounded. The ball entered  
the lower part of his back, near the spine, and passed up  
into his body. Three shots were fired, and the first one  
unfortunately took effect on Mr. Cheyne; another ball  
grazed Mr. Rait's coat, but did not wound him. The  
reason given for this outrageous act is this, Mr. George  
Rait, lately took some lands, which were formerly set  
under a decree, to a man named Dunn, but the lease  
having expired, Dunn gave them up, thinking the lease  
would set them at a rent lower. They were again ad-  
vertised and set up by auction, when Mr. G. Rait was the  
successful bidder. At the time he went to take posses-  
sion, the country people opposed him, but having called  
in the assistance of the Sheriff, he ultimately had the  
occupants turned out *pro forma*, but he restored them  
again immediately to their holdings. There are two per-  
sons taken up on suspicion, one of them rather respectable,  
and a collector of harony tax. The moment the doleful  
news reached Dublin, Dr. Cheyne, accompanied by Sur-  
geon Cusack, posted to Edenderry, and found the unfor-  
tunate young gentleman suffering dreadfully from the  
wound.

The accounts this day we are happy to learn, state that  
young Mr. Cheyne still lives.  
On Sunday last John Cox, Esq, Coroner, held an in-  
quest on the body of John Hennessy, at Rockhill, in  
this County. Verdict—Died of wounds received in an  
affray in Limerick by persons who are known, but have  
absconded. Surgeon Franklin attended.

At ten o'clock on Sunday night last, information was  
conveyed to the Police Office, that Michael Sullivan,  
charged as principal in the murder of Michael Ahern,  
last Races, and for whose apprehension a warrant had  
issued after the Coroner's Inquest, was secreted in a  
small house in Garryowen, thither a party of Police in-  
stantly hastened in disguise, and placed watch on the  
front and rear for fear of escape. Two of the Constables  
then forced in the outer door, and after a short search  
discovered Sullivan in a back room. He became quite  
unnerved on view of the Police, confident as he was  
perfect security the moment before, but quickly recov-  
ering himself, he surrendered at once, and was march-  
ed off in custody to the Police Office. Monday morn-  
ing he was transmitted to the City Gaol, surrounded by  
great crowd of all ages and sexes, exhibiting the un-  
usually lively anxiety.
