We are concerned to state that the body of the
Hon. Mrs. William Massy, whose deplorable fate
we announced in our last, has not yet been found.
The bodies of the two Hewitt's, both very fine
young men, are still missing. M'Namara, the
butler of Mrs. Massy, has left five destitute or-
phanas. He was interred yesterday.

About one o'clock on Thursday morning, a fire
burst out in the kitchen of a house in Rutland-
street after the family and all the neighbourhood
had retired to rest. Most fortunately, two young
men in passing, noticed the volume of smoke
ascending thro' the iron grating on the flag way,
and they instantly alarmed the inmates. The most
prompt assistance was had and vigorously applied;
by those means the fire, which a short time longer
unperceived, would involve a whole range of
houses in flames, was effectually extinguished.—
The West of England Fire Engine was early
