Mr. Secretary Stanley has intimated that Go-
vernment mean to introduce a new measure re-
garding the constitution of public hospitals in
Ireland.

At the public dinner in Cork, last Monday, to
Dr. Baldwin, that gentleman declared that if re-
turned to Parliament, he would not only support
but propose a Repeal of the Legislative Union if
no other attempted it. He declared he would
again offer himself a candidate for Cork City, if
solicited by those who encouraged him in the last
contest.

The agents of Sir E. Deering have arrived in
Wexford, and have issued summonses for wit-
nesses to attend in London, against the 15th inst.,
in order to be examined on the Petition touching
Mr. Wigram's return for that town.

Eighteen hundred paupers, including 300 lunatics,
now occupy the House of Industry in Cork.
The number in the Mendicity Asylum of that City
exceeds three hundred. The Absentee proprietors
of the City and County Cork are to be applied to
for assistance. The collection of the Mayor and
Sheriffs for the former Institution was £1,400, of
which sum only £7 now remains in hand.

The public roads in Wexford County have been
rendered almost impassable by snow. It com-
menced falling late on Monday night, and con-
tinued next day without intermission. The conse-
quence has been the non-arrival of the mails.—
The day coach, with two additional horses, left
the town at nine, instead of six o'clock, its usual
hour, but was unable to proceed farther than
Coolanick, about eight miles distant. It returned
in the evening.

In consequence of the severe snow and frost, the
Curragh coursing meeting is adjourned to the 15th
of March.

The demand upon the banks in Cork for gold,
languished on Tuesday, and yesterday it nearly
died a natural death—only a few nonsensical strag-
glers having at intervals made their appearance.
The Birmingham gentry have shewn surprising
address in their counterfeit sovereigns.

The Branch Bank of Ireland and that of the
Provincial Bank in Galway have ceased discount-
ing. They continue, however, to pay in gold,
although the demand for it is not carried on to any-
thing like the extent with which it is sought in
other places considerably inferior to Galway in
commercial importance.

John Mathews, a Process-server, was murdered
at Nobber, on Friday last.

Last Monday, twenty fishing-boats were over-
taken by a desperate gale, near Lough Foyle,
Derry. Most of the boats instantly cut away
their lines and made for land, but a few others un-
fortunately remained to lift their nets, and the
consequence was fatal. Three boats crews, con-
sisting of twenty-one men, perished with their
barks, leaving altogether seventy-three helpless
orphans without any provision. The cries of the
wives and children on learning this dreadful casu-
alty were most heart rending.

Monday night a soldier of the 83d Regiment
was drowned at Enniskillen, in a state of intoxica-
tion.

Mr. Michael Murray, Overseer of Works, was
transmitted from Nenagh to this City yesterday,
on a charge of bigamy, by a guard of Police.—
The prisoner is charged with having recently
married, at St. John's Church, in this City, a Lady
of the name of Delmege, his former wife yet
living. He is lodged in the City Gaol, under
committal of the Mayor.

Six female convicts, from Galway, left this City
on Thursday morning for Cork, under a military
escort.

Inspector-General Dombrain, of the Coast Guard service,
arrived in Tarbert on Tuesday last, and immediately pro-
ceeded to inspect the Forts, and the respective stations of
the Coast-Guards. The party stationed at Kilkerran Forts
are to be removed to Labeshceda—this after large quantities
of provisions, and stores having been laid up in those Forts
by order of Government, which at all events, require to be
well guarded in times so critical as the present. Lieutenant
Robinson, R. N. of the Coast Guard service stationed at
Killee, is ordered forthwith to the north of Ireland.
