To the Editor of the Limerick Chronicle.
SIR—Seeing by the Chronicle of the 26th ultimo, the Kilmallock Cup is advertised to be raced for, as usual, on Easter Monday next, I conceive it right for me to state that I consider the Cup to be my property, having won it for three years in succession, and having instituted law proceedings against the Stewards of the last race, for its recovery. A report is also prevalent, and I have seen it also in your columns, on the 12th ult. to the effect that "the last race on Easter Monday, 1830, has been declared void by the Stewards of the Turf Club," &c. With reference to this rumour, I beg to say that I, who am principally concerned, have not been informed of any such decision; nor do I conceive the Turf Club Stewards would interfere. In the month of June last, I wrote to Mr. Joseph Gubbins, one of the Stewards of the last race, begging of him to communicate to Mr. J. Ievers, another Steward, the subject of my letter, which was, demanding the Cup—or their grounds for withholding it from me; to which I received in answer the annexed letter, but which was not followed up in the fair spirit it manifested, as since that time I have not heard from either of the Stewards; and considering myself to have been very badly treated, I am determined on the account (not so much for the value of the Cup firmly to persevere in the proceedings now commenced, and am rejoiced that I shall have an opportunity, by the case coming to trial, of proving the means and engines besides horse power, planned to prevent my horse winning the last race, even at the sacrifice, I may say, of the life of his rider, Mr. George Smith, who only escaped the sanguinary snare of a butcherly mob, by riding in coat and trousers, instead of the usual jockey dress. I may, Mr. Editor, take up too much space in your columns and am, Sir, your's, &c.
