Hon. Justice Webb, arrived in town last week with his Lordship's Registrar, Rowley and, Esq., from Dublin, and will leave on Monday morning for Ennis.

Grand Jury of the County Clare will be in before the Judges at Ennis next Monday, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, when Crown business immediately commences. There are 98 cases for trial, including nine for abduction, and one for murder.

Major Warburton has arrived in Dublin from Ennis and Castlebar.

On Friday night an armed party attacked a farmer's house in Ennis, and robbed him of money and other property. They went to his son's house which was close by. In the first house they locked up all the inmates in a room, then a brave young man, named John Considine, escaped through the roof, and called on a neighbour, James O'Connell, for help, who, with his servant, James Hogan, turned out. They found the armed party coming to the second house they robbed, and they bravely seized some of them after a long contest, his name is Michael O'Connell, from near Applevale. He got a severe beating in the contest, but is not in danger from it; on his person were two threatening notices, the body written in ink, and the signature, "Terry Alt," written on each in blood—the notices are now in possession of Mr. Vokes. The prisoner is now in custody, and the witnesses are under the protection of the Magistrate.

Last week a large field of wheat, the property of James O'Connell, of Glenwilliam, Esq. a Magistrate of the County of Limerick, was torn up, and the young produce scattered about. On Friday night the boundaries of several farms on the edge of the Counties Clare and Galway, were maliciously burnt to the ground. Several of the gentry are compelled to fence out ground at a very low rent per acre.

Dragoons lost their arms near Gort this week. They have since returned, excepting a sword.
