A verdict of £134 5s. 7d. was returned yesterday, before
the City Sheriffs, for damages sustained by Mr. Paul Erson,
to his mill and concerns at Askeaton, in the riots of last June.

Baron Pennefather having finished the present-
ments and discharged the County Grand Jury, on
Thursday, left town for Beechmount, near Rath-
keale, the seat of Thos. Lloyd, Esq. on his way to
Tralee, where his Lordship opens the commission
for Kerry, this day. Judge Jebb also left this
City for Tralee on Thursday.

The Grand Jury of the County Limerick have,
without a single dissentient, recorded their con-
viction that the maintenance of the Legislative
Union is essential to the welfare and stability of
both countries. The foreman and eleven mem-
bers of the Grand Jury have likewise adopted a
resolution in favour of Parliamentary Reform.—
The resolutions appear in our columns.

The man who was wounded and made prisoner
at the attack on Mr. Walton's house near Sixmile-
bridge, had a flask of gunpowder and flints in his
possession. In the encounter with the insurgents
one of the Police had his coat perforated by four
slugs.

At Waterford Assizes, William Neill was found
guilty of forcibly violating the person of Honora
O'Brien, at Cappoquin, and ordered for execution
the 2d of April. In the case of Curren and
Whelan v. Barrow, an action to recover the
amount of £100 promissory note passed since
1814, the jury found £127 damages. Mary Gaff-
ney, a fruit-woman, was tried for killing her
husband, fined 6d. and discharged.

At Wexford Assizes, Thomas Kennelly and
Richard Synnott, were tried before Baron Foster,
for the murder of William Campion, in the town of
Enniscorthy, last July—Verdict, manslaughter,
to be transported for life.

Yesterday upwards of 4,000 men turned up a
considerable tract of land in the Holy Island, in
the Upper Shannon, near Scariff. This species of
outrage upon private property has now become
quite common with the peasantry in Clare.

The sum granted for the Recruiting Service in
the Army this year is £376,111; charge for Staff
and Hospital Officers, £124,522. The Riding
establishment at Maidstone is likely to be given up.
A reduction is to be made in the amount and
number of the Military Staff in Canada.
