“That it is the interest, as well as the duty, of the Legislature to combine in arresting the progress of those outrages, and in re-establishing the uncontrolled ascendency of the Law.

“That, while we pledge ourselves, at any risk to our person, to extinguish the present system of terror, we deem it our duty, at this crisis, to express the deep solicitude we feel for the happiness and welfare of the People of our County, and that, at the first moment of restored tranquillity, we shall take steps into our warmest and most cordial consideration.

Persons sent from the neighbourhood of Limerick to Ennis, charged with conspiracy to murder Mr. O'Connell, fully committed to Gaol, under the advice of the Attorney-General.

The Attorney-General arrived here yesterday evening, with a court of the 17th Lancers, from Ennis, and this morning for Dublin.

Mr. O'Loughlen arrived in town this day from Ennis, and left immediately after for Dublin.

At three o'clock Judges Jebb and Pennefather, attending the Clare Grand Jury, arrived in town under a guard of the 17th Lancers.

The County of Clare is by Government to be divided into districts, with a Stipendiary Magistrate at the head of each, and a number of military justices of the peace to assist in the difficult duties now induced by the insurgents.

The present Grand Jury of the County of Clare are directed to enquire into the statement which appeared in the Dublin Register, that an unaccounted for sum of £14,000 is in the County Treasury.
