

disturbed state of our own County, at present moment.

Dr. Ryan, the Roman Catholic Bishop of this diocese, earnestly exhorted his flock on Sunday last, at St. John's Chapel, against any violation of the laws or the peace of Society. Reference was had to the illegal acts of the peasantry in Clare and Limerick, and the destructive consequences which result from outrage and combination, were described with peculiar force.

Many of the gentry have come in from the County Clare this week, to reside in town.

Monday last, the Mayor arrested a fellow in George's-street carrying a printed placard, the manifest object of which was to excite disturbance in the City. The words were—"We want work—we cannot starve—country labourers get a preference, and we hope the public will take our case into consideration." The writer and printer of this manifesto were bound over in heavy penalties by the Mayor, whose active interposition at an early stage very probably prevented more serious proceedings.

This day an order was received by the City Sheriffs to send off the following convicts, under sentence of transportation, to the hulk Surprise at Cork:—Denis Kenneally, William Mara, Patrick Houlehan, John Mara, Patrick Lynch, Michael Fitzgerald, John Lynch, John Hassett, Bartholomew Barry, Pat. Daly, James Corbett, John Fitzgerald, James Mullins, Pat. Mullins, Edward Glen, Michael Gunn, Wm. Hurly, and Patrick Shehan.

Four hundred infantry, and 100 cavalry Police, are to be added to the Constabulary force of the County Galway, making altogether near 1,200 men.

In addition to the 500 Constables to be appointed for the County Galway, it is stated that the force will be augmented through Ireland to the extent of 3,000, for service in the disturbed Counties.

One hundred additional Police are ordered for the County Roscommon, and 100 for Kilkenny.

Sir Henry Parnell, Bart. was re-elected M. P. for the Queen's County, on Saturday last, at Maryboro, without opposition.

In the event of the Reform Bill becoming law, Lord Glentworth has signified his desire to offer himself for the representation of the City Limerick.

The Lord Bishop of Killaloe has arrived at Clarisford house, from Dublin.

The Rev. Mr. Garston late Rector of Kilpeacon in this county, was seized with an apoplectic fit on the 9th last November at Ceylon, of which Island he is Chaplain.

The sum paid for corn in this City in the present season exceeded that of the last year by £108,000.

The wheat shipped in the Economy from this port to Bristol, which vessel was wrecked at Castletownsend, on the Cork coast, was sold this day in a damaged state.

The petition of the Chamber of Commerce of this City to the House of Lords, in favor of Reform, has been presented by the Earl of Limerick.

At Tralee Quarter Sessions, Timothy Kennedy, of Killiney, county Kerry, an opulent farmer, was sentenced to 12 months imprisonment, and to stand in the pillory for wilful perjury.

At Tralee Sessions, Mr. William Nelligan was tried for assaulting William Thomas in the Roman Catholic Chapel of Dingle, for refusing to subscribe to the O'Connell Tribute, and acquitted.

The Most Noble William Henry Marquess of Anglesey, Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland, has this day, by Letters Patent, been pleased to appoint Mr. Thomas Jas. Boyd, of No. 43, Patrick-street, gun-maker to his Excellency in this district. The honor thus conferred upon our very ingenious fellow-citizen Mr. Boyd, is, we believe, without parallel in this City, as the same honorary distinction was bestowed to him by the late Chief Governor of Ireland, his Grace the Duke of Northumberland, and has been now renewed by the gallant and distinguished Marquess, who is his immediate successor in the Government of Ireland.

The Assistant-Barrister, Mr. Major, had the man sworn to his statement, and ordered informations to be taken for the felony, and the delinquent was immediately committed to jail.
