ATROCIOUS MURDER.—Sunday morning after breakfast, Mr. Henry Wheeler, of Killuragh, near Cappamore, left his house on horseback to attend the fair of Nenagh next day, for the purchase of stock. He had journeyed but a few miles on his route, when at a place called Garravane he was fired at from behind a ditch by assassins who lay in wait for their victim, and the unfortunate Gentleman fell from his horse on the road, pierced by three balls, one in the head and two in the body. Mr. Wheeler's family were unaware of the horrid fatality, and unsuspecting of any accident, until they saw his horse returning to the house, without a rider, in an hour or two after. They were instantly seized with alarm, and one of the sons hurried along the road his father had taken in the morning. He was soon aware of the bloody deed, having met a few country people bearing home the dead body of his parent, which presented a most shocking spectacle, disfigured with dust and blood. The head shewed an extensive fracture, through which part of the brains protruded, and from the gun-shot wounds in his breast a quantity of blood still continued to flow. It appears the assassins had crossed the country towards Bilboa after accomplishing the deadly act, and there fired more shots in exultation. Upwards of £50 in cash were found in Mr. Wheeler's pockets, so that robbery was not the object of his assassins, but systematic and deliberate murder. The deceased Gentleman was resident Agent on Lord Stradbroke's estates, and principal manager of Sir John Ribton's property. He was remarkable for kindly habits, undeviating integrity, and a most friendly disposition. Rather advanced in years, he naturally wished to provide for his grown children, and for this purpose he obtained possession of two untenanted farms for his sons. This, however, was a crime of dreadful magnitude in the eyes of the peasantry, and no other cause can be assigned for his violent and unexpected death. Thus perished the father of six children between twelve and one o'clock on the Sabbath Day, on a high road, and by the hands of assassins. The Police commenced an active pursuit on hearing of the murder, but no trace whatever could be had of the sanguinary criminals. Disguise it if we can!—The truth is, the peasantry, under the system that rules in Clare, and unfortunately spreading in this County, will much sooner screen a murder of this sort than expose it to justice.

It cannot be difficult to infer from the above, that our County, which we fondly hoped would save its character from the guilt of human blood, and recoil with horror from the multiplied crimes of Clare, now affords terrific proof of a wish to seize the burning brand, and mingle in the same career of death and devastation. The rustic warfare which rages in that unfortunate County, has cast its flaming embers into this, and unless the magistrates grapple fearlessly with the monster of insurrection, we tell them again that the very worst calamities which can afflict the whole frame of civilized society, will be the unerring consequence of apathy or indifference to the scenes now opening upon us.

Twelve men from Cahirclish, and five from Kilnallock, have been committed to gaol this week for turning up ground. It is thought that a Special Commission will issue for the trial of these persons.
