Captain Cox, of Mount Pleasant, near Kilrush, was out on patrol last Wednesday night, with two policemen and eleven of the 5th Regiment, when after a pursuit of seven! miles, he same up about 2 o'clock in the morning with a party of insurgents, in the vicinity of Kilkee. They were after breaking in the house door of a poor farmer, and were flogging him on the calves of the legs with a great cut whip, when Captain Cox came in view ; one of their seem irumediately attempted to fire, but his piece barnt priming, and the two police discharged their carbines. The soldiers also fired and charged the insurgents was led with the utmost precipitation across the country, leaving in their flight a gun, pistol, sword, and scythe, the cart whip above stated, six hats, and three shirts which covered their con. mon dress. The victim of those fellows was most happy at being released from the scourge. One of the party was wounded, but no prisoners were made. Captain Cox's activity as a Magistrate, is most praiseworthy, this has been his second brush with the insurgents.

The remains of Serjeant Robinson, of the 5th, whose murder by the peasantry we stated on Wednesday, were interred in the Church-yard of Ennis, on Tuesday, with military honors. He was a man of unexceptionable character, beloved by his brother soldiers, and respected by every officer in the regiment. The funeral was attended by a great concourse of the gentry, and respectable inhabitants of the town.

As to the persons who were present outside Mr. Kennedy's house, and who were impliented in the attack and murder of Arricant Robinson, as a matter of course, the public expect that every information will be given by the Rev. Mr. Kennedy, the Rev. Mr. O'Shaughnessy, and Mr. Francis Kennedy, to whom the prominent actors must be known.—This is a duty that cannot be avoided or shrunk from.
