Mr. Maurice O'Connell, M. P. and Mr. William R. Mahon, left Ennis on Friday morning last with their respective friends to fight a duel, the former attended by Lieutenant M'Carthy, h. p. 96th regiment, who carried the message, the other by James B. Butler, Esq. It appears the violence of the mob was so great that Mr. Butler did not conceive it safe to place his friend, Mr. Mahon, on the ground, and the principals returned to Ennis, re-infected. Some difference of opinion having grown out of this affair between the seconds, another meeting was proposed at Scattery Island in the Shannon, between Lieutenant M'Carthy and Mr. Butler, but the parties did not meet.

Monday morning at 5 o'clock, Charles O'Connell, of Ennis, Esq. attended by Charles Brennan, Esq. and George Comyn, of Hollywell, Esq. attended by James O'Gorman, Esq. met at Annahouly, near Birdhill, County Tipperary, to settle an affair of honor. Surgeon Franklin, jun. attended professionally for the principals—Mr. John O'Connell, of Grena, Mr. Maurice O'Connell, M. P. Mr. Thomas Steele, and a party of Kerry gentlemen arrived with Mr. Charles O'Connell—Mr. O'Gorman Mahon, Mr. Wm. R. Mahon and others accompanied Mr Comyn, to the ground. The affair originated in the late contest for Clare, where both parties were bound over by a Magistrate. The meeting was then appointed to be held at Ballinacurra on Sunday evening, but Mr. Woodburne, Chief Constable of Police, succeeded in arresting Mr. Comyn, who was concealed in the coal cellar of Glin's hotel, when the Mayor immediately bound that gentleman over to observe the peace in this City and County.—Tipperary was then fixed on by the friends of both parties for a meeting, which accordingly took place on Monday morning. It appears the signal "ready, fire," was not perfectly understood, as Mr. Comyn fired his pistol first at the word "ready"—Mr. O'Connell did not return the fire but discharged his shot in the air. At the earnest solicitation of all present, the two combatants then advanced half way, shook hands, and left the ground on the best terms.

Mr. Maurice O'Connell, M. P. Mr. John O'Connell, and their cortege of Kerry friends left town on Monday for Killarney.

The heat of the weather continues very oppressive, and on Sunday it was remarkably so, when a heavy shower of rain fell about three o'clock, and endured for half an hour. The rain however was very partial, and did not extend beyond the liberties. On Monday, for some hours there was a loud roaring of thunder, accompanied by frequent flashes of lightning.

Monday, a man of the name of Bourke was struck dead by lightning at Castle Guard, in this County. Another man was holding a cow by the horns near Garryspellane, for a woman to milk, when a flash of lightning killed himself and the beast on the spot. The woman was so overcome with terror that her recovery is not expected.

On Sunday and Monday several peals of thunder were heard in Waterford and its neighbourhood. The upper parts of the County Tipperary and the County Waterford were visited with awful thunder storms, followed by several refreshing showers of rain.

The mortal remains of Giles Daxon, Esq. who filled the office of Treasurer of the county Clare, for a period of thirty years, were interred at the family burying place, Dromcliffe, on Sunday morning, followed by an immense concourse of the gentry and peasantry.

The house of Pierce O'Brien, Esq. of Darra, was accidentally consumed on Friday last. Some of the furniture was saved.

Yesterday, a melancholy accident occurred to Richard Baker, Esq. of Thomas-street. He was in the act of stepping into his gig, with a foot near the shaft, when the horse took fright and ran off furiously through the street. Mr. Baker got entangled in the wheel, and was dragged with his head on the ground, a considerable distance before the horse was stopped. We regret to say he is severely injured in the body, besides a fracture of the right leg.

Lucy Courtenay, fifth daughter of William, second Viscount Courtenay, and sister to the Noble Lord who has recently established his claim to the Earldom of Devon. By the Countess, whose dissolution occurred, December, 1821, his Lordship has left a surviving family of five children, viz. Ernest, Lord Vaughan, born October, 1800 (now Earl of Lisburne); 2, Hon. George Vaughan, born February, 1802, Captain in the Rifle Brigade; 3, Hon. John Shafto Vaughan, born October, 1803; 4, Hon. William Malet Vaughan, Lieutenant 4th Dragoon Guards, born 1807; 5, Lady Lucy Harriet Vaughan, born February, 1809, unmarried. His Lordship's sister, Lady Dorothy Elizabeth Vaughan, married the late Laurence Palk. Lady Malet Vaughan, his Lordship's other sister, is unmarried. Lord Lisburne was little known by the part he took in politics; indeed the Earldom, being an Irish title, did not entitle him to a seat in the House of Lords.
