

STATE OF CLARE.

A large number of men, embodied in Dublin under Sir John Harvey, for the Police in this County, have reached Ennis. Fifty of them are now in Tulla, under the immediate command of Mr. Colthurst, Stipendiary Magistrate.

Friday in the middle of the noon day, five or six hundred fellows assembled and regularly drove all the stock off of ten or twelve Burren farms, between Killfenora and Corofin.

Among the farms swept away by Mrs. Alt and children were—the lands of Mr. O'Connell, at Ballybane and Bally-scanner; of Mr. Powell, at Lemineagh and Clonkeen; Mr. Gallinan, at Cloheen and Sheshiveinore; Mr. Butler, at Ballykasheen; Mr. D'Arcy, at Lisket; Mr. D. Kenny, at Ballylumacahill; all the houses on these lands, in which the herdsmen lived, were levelled to the ground, and a fine barn on Lemneagh, belonging to Mr. D. Powell, was pulled down; several other farms have been cleared, and all the stock are now straying about the country.

There have been, for the last week, eleven cows, branded with W. A. B. straying about the parish of Kilnaboy, without any person to claim or look after them, unless such as do so for the purpose of driving them away from their own land.

On Saturday, Messrs. Borough and Vandeleur apprehended eight Terrys in the neighbourhood of Kilmihill, and next morning Captain Cox arrived in company with nine more of Lady Clare's children. Cooleen Lodge, beyond Carrigaholt, the property of Robert Cox, of Fairy Hill, in the county Tipperary, Esq., a Magistrate for the County Clare, was demolished, furniture, &c. destroyed. A few nights previous they beat his driver, an honest and inoffensive man. Several houses at and near Carrigaholt, were attacked last week. No less than twenty houses were levelled in the parishes of Kilmihill and Kilwacuan.

Sunday last Francis Kennedy, Esq. son of the Rev. Mr. Kennedy, of Ballinacally, was escorted into Ennis, to prosecute at the Commission those persons charged with the murder of Serjeant Robinson, of the 5th Regiment. It was in the house of the Rev. Mr. Kennedy that the Police took refuge, when attacked by the peasantry.

The Rev. Mr. O'Shaughnessy, P. P. of Ballinacally, has been bound in a surety of £300 to attend at the approaching Commission, and in a further sum of £500 to give evidence on the trial of those charged with Serjeant Robinson's murder.

Major Maxwell, of the 1st Dragoon Guards, since his appointment to the Magistracy of Clare, has been indefatigable and successful in the apprehension of offenders in various outrages committed in the neighbourhood of Miltown Malbay. About ten days ago he apprehended eight persons, and on Sunday night twelve more, for house-breaking and other offences, all of whom are in custody, to abide trial at the Commission. The different patrols kept up both by day and night, is very distressing to the Officers and privates, as well of the Dragoons, as of Captain Harris and his party of the 5th Regiment, yet nevertheless it is done with alacrity and zeal, highly creditable to all.

Between the hours of eleven and twelve o'clock on Sunday last, two persons dressed in women's clothes, came to the residence of Francis Morrice, Esq. at Springfield, Six-mile-Bridge, County Clare, one of them armed with a gun, and served him with a notice to discharge, from his employment, a faithful man of his. They were perfectly civil to Mr. Morrice and offered no violence to himself or his family.

Mr. Butler, of Bunnahow, after suffering various persecutions, his life continually in danger, at length has yielded, because he had no protection, to the demands of the insurgents—and undertaken to give up his farms provided they would allow him to dispose of his stock. In consequence he was desired to turn out his manure and cut his seed—and on last Monday a party of near 600 persons assembled on his ground, and sowed it in the day.

Mr. Hubbert C. C. P. from Woodford, brought in four prisoners to Loughrea, fully identified with recent outrages in that quarter.

A party of Terrys visited the neighbourhood of St. Clerans on Thursday night, and took some arms.

At Cappatagil a large assemblage collected on Tuesday evening, and served a notice to quit on Lord French's Herd, also stating that the farm he holds from Mr. Donnelan of Ballieghter should be surrendered and given out to Tenants in small holdings. Another meeting was held there on Thursday. The system is also spreading into Cumnamarra, and two men are committed to Galway Jail for administering unlawful oaths in the neighbourhood of Clifden.
