DISTRESS IN CONNAUGHT.

A deputation from the Mayo Central (Relief) Association, consisting of the Right Rev. Dr. Machale, Rev. John Blusse, Bart., John Browne, Esq. M. P.; Rev. Mr. Stack, Captain Stuart, Rev. Mr. Strickland, and the Rev. Bernard Burke, appeared upon the Lord Lieutenant at the Castle, for representing to his Excellency the melancholy state of the country in that country. The Lord Lieutenant very cordially received the deputation with cordiality. Mr. Browne, as representative for Mayo, explained the state of the country, which was—to impress upon the Lord Lieutenant the absolute necessity that existed of their at once forwarding and exerting themselves to arrest the progress of famine and disease, which were now devastating the districts in the south-west of this country.

The exertions of the liberal Irish public, and the contributions of the people of England, and not to mention all the efforts made in Dublin to help the poor, prevailed to a frightful extent. The object of the deputation was, to implore of the government to interpose from otherwise inevitable destruction by the population of these districts.

The Lord Lieutenant appeared much affected by Mr. Browne's speech, which the honourable member offered to substantiate by the sworn testimony of the members of the deputation. The noble Marquis expressed regret that the Irish had not at their disposal funds at all adequate to the exigencies of the present disastrous period.

The deputation next waited on the Relief Association, from which they received a promise of a deputation then waited on the Mansion-house as a last resource, it was determined to make an humble appeal to the people of Dublin. A deputation accordingly waited this day, at three o'clock, and sundry carriages will attend on such an occasion.
